CITIZENSHIP IS FIRST IN STATE

Dallas School Pupils To Be Given "New Thought"

BETTER GOVERNMENT PLAN

Teachers For City Schools Ready To Take Up Work—Text Books For Grades Show Many New Changes—Morals and Manners One of New Courses.

As the result of recent action on the part of State Superintendent of Schools, J. A. Churchill, the boys and girls of Dallas, as well as all school children in schools of Oregon ranked as second class will not have to weary their brains any more endeavoring to find the "greatest common divisor," for the officer has determined that citizenship ranks first—text books next.

Superintendent Churchill has offered the following statement in reference to his action:

"Teach the boys and girls not the course of study, or textbooks. Make good citizens of our boys and girls. This is your work." That is the instruction given the teachers by Superintendent Churchill in the introduction of the course of study, which is ready for distribution today.

"Training for good citizenship and efficiency is the keynote of the new course of study in the grades," said Mr. Churchill.

Morals and Manners Course
In 1914 Mr. Churchill is going to add a complete course in morals and manners, as he says this is an important feature which has long been overlooked in the school courses. In the course now being issued he is paying the way for this new feature.

"While the course embodies many of the good features of the course of 1911," said Mr. Churchill, "there are quite a number of changes, many of which were made necessary by the adoption of new textbooks by the textbook commission in June of this year."

Better Civil Government Course
"A distinct course in civil government has also been prepared. Heretofore this has been a course in connection with the history course. While this has been given a certain emphasis, it is felt the study of civics has been neglected, on account of not having satisfactory teaching in this subject."

"The study of hygiene is also given an important place in the course of study, the idea being that a child cannot become an efficient citizen unless he has a sound body. A healthy mind and body are of more importance than the ability to enumerate the bones in one's body."

"The course in drawing which was so carefully prepared by Mrs. L. R. Alderman in the 1911 course of study is incorporated in the new course."

"Each subject has been carefully outlined with the view to its being helpful to the teacher in the presentation of the subject as a whole."

Fifth grade—Wheeler Graded Fifth Reader, Hick's Champion Spelling Book, Palmer Method of Business Writing, Complete Arithmetic of White, World Geography by Tarr & McMurray, Kimball Elementary English, book I, Introductory American History by Bourne & Benton, Primer of Sanitation by Ritchie.

Sixth grade—Wheeler Graded Sixth Reader, Hick's Champion Spelling Book, Palmer Method of Business Writing, Complete Arithmetic of White, World Geography by Tarr & McMurray, Kimball Elementary English, book I, Introductory American History by Bourne & Benton, Graded Lessons in Physiology and Hygiene by Krohn.

Seventh grade—Elson Grammar School Reader, book III; Hick's Champion Spelling Book, Palmer of Business Writing, Complete Arithmetic of White, World Geography by Tarr & McMurray, Kimball Elementary English, book II; A School History of the United States by Mace.

WISCONSIN PUTS BAN ON HORNS

WISCONSIN LAW SAYS THEY MUST BE LOUD, ABRUPT.

Author of New Law Gives Reasons Why Change in Conditions Are Necessary For Protection.

Milwaukee, Wis., Aug. 22.—The new Wisconsin automobile law which has just gone into effect provides that every automobile shall be equipped with a signal device capable of producing an abrupt sound sufficiently loud to serve as an adequate warning of danger.

The following statement regarding this law has been issued by its author, President James T. Drought of the Wisconsin State Automobile association:

"This law was enacted not only in the interests of automobile owners, but in the interests of pedestrians and users of other vehicles, who have a right to be seasonably and sufficiently warned of the approach of automobiles."

"With the din of noisy traffic on city streets and in passing other automobiles proceeding the same direction, many hand bulb horns are entirely ineffective, because they cannot be heard. With the present statute in force I am of the opinion that many if not all hand bulb horns in use are in direct violation of the law. In cases of collisions and resulting damage suits, the question of whether the automobile was equipped with a lawful signalling device which was used seasonably, may establish the liability of the automobile driver or materially affect the size of the verdict."

"I believe the time is not far distant when all automobile liability insurance companies will compel policy holders to discard the hand bulb horn in favor of something more effective, as a matter of self protection."
