The United States supreme court has recently handed down a decision that is of vital interest to dairymen and consumers of milk all over the coun-

try. Briefly, it is that a municipality has the right to require all dairy cows that furnish its milk supply to be tuberculin tested and to prevent the sale of any milk from cows not so tested. The case on which this decision was based was appealed from the city of both of Independence, September 30. Milwaukee.
