observers and at some stations by automatic gages, and measurements of the discharge of the streams are made by engineers of the survey. From these data the quantity of water flowing past the stations is determined. Stream flow records are of particular value in Oregon in the design, construction, and maintenance of water power plants and irrigation projects, in investigations for the classification of the public lands, and in Carey Act examinations. The records also find wide use in the state in all problems where the quantity of water is involved, such as those relating to water storage, seepage, river regulation, land drainage, stream pollution, and municipal water supplies. Such records are also of great value for general statistical and comparative purposes.

hausted. This gigantic cut will be nine miles long and will have a width at the bottom of 300 feet, which will be 40 feet above sea level, the normal level of the water being fixed at 85 feet. In Culbreth cut it is also to be remembered that nearly half of the excavation was originally done by the French. The Panama Canal means, from a standpoint of world commerce that the Straits of Magellan are moved practically 3500 miles northward. It means 14 days from New York to San Francisco by water; 4000 miles cut off from the present route from the Atlantic seaport to Valparaiso and that Yokohama is nearly 6000 miles closer to New Orleans.

POLK PEN WIN HONORS AT NORTH YAKIMA FAIR

Local Hens Capture Second Prize Against Big Field of Washington Competitors.

Polk county won additional distinctions in poultry raising last week when W. J. Garner of this city won second prize in the hen laying contest which recently closed at North Yakima, Wash. The contest was under the joint supervision of the Washington State college at Pullman and the Washington State Fair at North Yakima and the fact that Mr. Garner had hundreds of competitors makes the prize winning of double importance to this section of the country.

The Garner contestants in the poultry contest was a pen of single comb White Leghorns. The pen record was 389 eggs against the winning record of 401. Taking into consideration that the hens were two ears old and contesting against pullets, Mr. Garner has reason to believe that his pen made an excellent showing.

Mr. Garner is holding in readiness a pen of pullets which he will enter for the year's contest in North Yakima which is about to begin.
