OFFICERS PROBE NEW TAX TANGLE

**COUNTY JUDGE AND DISTRICT
 ATTORNEY INVESTIGATE**

County to Get Portion of Money
 Which Heretofore Went to Certain
 Towns—Assessment Reviewed.

Hoping to straighten out a tangle
 in preparing the next levy and bud-
 get for the county and to bolster up
 the general county road fund, County
 Judge Teal and District Attorney Up-
 john last week visited Salem to have
 a conference with Attorney General
 Crawford as to matters connected
 with the coming budget of the county
 court.

A number of towns in the county
 have allowed the county to expend
 money in improving county roads
 within their boundaries and have later
 after the improvements have been
 made out of the county road funds,
 created the town in a separate road
 district and have taken the attitude
 that as such they should receive the
 full benefit of all taxes collected from
 the taxable properties in the road dis-
 trict assessed for road purposes.

A conclusion was reached at the
 conference held in Salem that such
 road districts, as all others, should
 be entitled to 50 per cent of the
 amount raised out of the levy for
 county roads and that the balance
 should go into the general road fund.
 So that hereafter each road district

will receive 50 per cent of the amount
 levied against the property within the
 district and the balance will go into
 the general county road fund.

Some complaint has been received
 from citizens residing outside of road
 districts which are also towns, that,
 when hard surface pavement is laid,
 this is assessed against the abutting
 property owners, while the money
 which such abutting property owners
 raise as a part of the district road
 fund, is used in developing roads in
 another part of the town or district.
 They have objected that this is in the
 nature of a double taxation and that
 while they are compelled to pay for
 the hard surface roads in front of
 their own property, without outside
 assistance, they also aid in paying
 for other road improvement at the
 same time. This condition was dis-
 cussed somewhat and may be taken
 up later.

VOTERS ATTENTION.

In accordance with the provisions
 of a law enacted at the 1913 session
