LOCAL MAN HITS SHORT SELLERS

S. H. PETRE ASKS DIRECT QUESTION OF PORTLAND PAPER.

Wants to Know What Is To Be Done With Man Who Sells Something He Does Not Possess.

The following article which appeared in Sunday's issue of the Portland Journal was written by S. H. Petre, one of the largest hop growers in Polk county and had its effect for the following day hops were quoted at 23 and 23½ cents. It is a good, clear and concise account of the hop condition in Oregon and should be of general interest to growers of this vicinity:

I was wondering what the hop-growers would do if there was a decent crop of hops the world over next year. As there is a shortage this year, the largest since 1890, according to reports, taking the present market in consideration, we won't get cultivating money out of them, on the Pacific coast especially, next year. Fellow growers, have you stopped to consider the matter thoroughly? You remember when hops were low, dealers told us we had better sell at this time of year; they will soon be old. What did they mean? I don't know, for now they are offering around 20c for 1913 hops, and the 1912s are worth from 22c to 25c in the New York markets—that is, Pacific coast hops, and New York hops are quoted from 18c to 25c per pound for 1912. Isn't it strange? What do you think of it? Our 1912 hops are worth more, or are quoted higher, than New York 1912, and New York 1913 are quoted today at from 20c to 45c, per pound, and Pacific coast's are what? Why, they aren't worth horse bedding, in the dealers' and consumers' conception of the matter.

What do you think about it? Pacific coast hop-growers, have we grown an inferior quality of hops this year? It has been said on good authority that we have the finest quality of hops ever produced. Then it must be we have grown too many. It looks like it, doesn't it? Let's see. Did Oregon have a bumper crop? No more than last year. How about Washington and California? Reports say that they fell down. Then it can't be an over-production, for England, only had 253,000 hundredweight—a half crop. Germany has about a half crop and all the hop-growing sections of the world were short, according to reports and prices elsewhere.

Then it's not attributed to an inferior quality or an over-production, for the consumption is greater than the statistics.

Then, growers, where is the trouble? It is whispered that there is a short seller somewhere. The poor fellow! Let's get in and help him out, for England, Germany, Russia, nor Russia, nor even New York won't lend him a helping hand. So it's up to the Pacific coast hop-growers to help him, if he gets it. What do you say, boys, will we help him? It's up to us. Even the Lord has turned his back on him and given the producer a light yield, so new producers, it's up to us. What will we do with him?

According to the world's markets we should be getting 35c for our hops, but that poor fellow who sold short—what will we do with him? The creator has turned him down, because he sold that which he didn't have unless the Pacific coast hop-growers have pity and compassion on him and help him out. Hop-growers, shall we do it?

Clerk Mulvey granted license to wed to Louis Fischer and Lida McDunn; H. C. Dornoff and Hattie Lewis; D. J. Grant and Florence Hart and J. O. Stevenson and Anna Glenn.

Attorney J. C. Adams opened up an office upstairs over the Wilson block.

Teachers' examination was being held in Dallas.

Before the city council the discussion of the proposed water plant was taken up. The estimated cost was \$12,000. The remainder was instructed to advertise the sale of bonds for the city in a sum not to exceed \$14,000. The committee appointed to locate the site of a pumping plant were R. C. Craven, A. J. Martin, J. J. Williams and D. J. Riley.

In the commissioners' court the Stone road damages were allowed and the road opened.

Owing to the fact that L. M. McElroy who for three years had been in the employ of the Observer taking but one week's vacation at that time, had left the concern to help his father plant 20 acres in hops, the paper had considerable difficulty in securing its weekly publication.

DALLAS WAS FOR APPROPRIATIONS

TUESDAY'S ELECTION BRINGS MANY SURPRISES.

Incomplete Returns Shows Defeat of Sterilization Bill; Compensation Act Carries Big.

Polk county fell decidedly short in the vote for the University of Oregon appropriation in Tuesday's election, despite the fact that the county was expected to go the reverse. Other issues with the exception of the county attorney bill carried. But little interest in the election was shown and for the reason that many of the precinct officers forgot to furnish the county clerk with marked ballots, it is impossible to secure the exact returns.

The returns so far show the following results:

U. of O. Repair—Yes, 796; no 842.
U. of O. Appropriation—Yes, 768; no, 776.

Sterilization—Yes, 637; no, 899.
County Attorney—Yes, 765; no 640.
Compensation act—Yes, 1024; no 463.

With the exception of the sterilization bill, every measure on the ballot was passed by the voters Tuesday. The University appropriations, the Workmen's Compensation Act, and County Attorney Bills met the favor of Multnomah county voters and the Interstate Bridge measure, carrying a bond issue of \$1,250,000, were carried.

The two university bills will make available \$175,000 for the institution, \$100,000 of this amount being for the construction and equipment of a class and administration building.

Another emphatic vote was cast for the workmen's compensation act. There was a fight made against this measure from unknown sources, but the result showed the voters were strongly in favor of the act. The act will automatically compensate workmen who are injured or if killed make provision for their dependents.

The one bill which was rejected was the sterilization act. This was one of the five bills passed by the legislature and referred to the people. The people did not want it, considering the measure too drastic. Under its provisions, the superintendents of the various state institutions were to report on the inmates and the State Board of Health could order surgical operations on such inmates as were reported as habitual criminals, perverts or moral degenerates.

While there was opposition to the adoption of the County Attorney bill the bill was passed. Under this bill the Governor will appoint County Attorneys in 19 counties and these will have the same powers as the 14 District Attorneys. The appointees of the Governor will hold office until the general election in 1916. The salaries of each County Attorney is specified in the bill, the compensation being regulated according to the importance of legal business in each of the political subdivisions.

New York—Tammany suffered a crushing defeat in yesterday's elections. The organization was not only engulfed in a plurality of 121,209 votes with which the fusionists elected John Purser Mitchell mayor of New York City, but in many up-state districts a severe rebuke was administered to the Tammany democracy that has been in control of the state since the days of Governor Hughes.

William Sulzer, deposed by Tammany's exposure of his unlisted campaign contributions was re-elected to public office, less than three weeks having intervened since he was removed from the governor's chair. He will return to Albany in January as a member of the Assembly. Many of the legislators who voted to impeach him met defeat, with the result that he will sit in an anti-Tammany House.

Washington—Congressional election returns were received here as follows:

J. H. Cantor, Democrat, elected from twentieth New York district.
Charles P. Coady, Democrat, elected from Third Maryland district.
C. D. Paige, Republican, elected from third Massachusetts district.
G. W. Ladd, Democrat, elected from thirteenth New York district.

Democratic Governors were elected yesterday in each state where this office was filed. Massachusetts, New Jersey and Virginia. With the exception of New York State, where the Tammany Democracy was severely rebuked, more Democratic than Republican victories were recorded at the polls.
