High School Students at Monmouth to do Needed Carpentry.

The cannery building in this city is soon to be converted into a gymnasium. The machinery was removed and the Monmouth Evaporating & Cannery Company is operating in another building.

The High School is to take steps toward the rearranging of the interior and a basketball floor will be provided.

Athletics are greatly encouraged for this year. The boys of the school are planning to apply their learning and will act as carpenters under a superintendent. The student body association will manage the gymnasium affairs.

Polk County Highways.

As a result of movements by Commercial Clubs of the county and inhabitants of rural districts for better roads, many miles of public highways in Polk County are ready for Winter use by automobiles. United efforts by everyone interested have resulted in the present high standard. Thousands of wagon-loads of yellow "slough gravel" were hauled in the Dallas, Independence, Monmouth and Rieckreall districts, and it is believed that this was the best move made. Continual traffic for nearly two years has put the roads in a condition unsurpassed by any in the valley.

This material is very different from that gotten from the river beds, containing much cement.

One of the leading factors in the movement for better roads has been the automobile owner, who in many cases in the farming district has plowed and graded roads from his place to the place he travels most frequently. In this way expense which would have gone to the county, or not have existed, has been borne by individuals. Some of the roads improved by the co-operation of farmers with the county are: Buena Vista to Airlie; Independence to Salem, Buena Vista to Monmouth; Monmouth to Rieckreall; Buena Vista Airlie, Falls City, Dallas; Rieckreall to Salem, Dallas; Dallas to Perrydale, Falls City.

During July, this summer, automobile traffic is believed to have been the heaviest ever known in the county. Tourists from many sections of the state were attracted by Polk County's smooth, wide and hard roads. The roads from Dallas to Salem through Rieckreall and from Independence to Salem are said to be the two best highways in the county.

Testers Prove Success.

That the schools of Polk County where Babcock milk testers have been installed have reached the expectation of County School Superintendent Seymour, is shown from the first monthly report of the students who have entered the contest. Their work according to the superintendent has been exceptionally good, and as soon as more testers can be secured a number of other schools will be supplied with them. Testers have been placed at the following schools: Salt Creek, Ballston, Perrydale and Bethel. Last week, W. A. Barr, of the Oregon Agricultural College, and who was largely responsible in choosing Polk County for the test work, made a visit to the various schools.

The following good words for Airlie, Oregon, spoken by the Independence Enterprise of last issue.

Business transactions during the past season in our sister town of Airlie and the surrounding country show that section is in a most prosperous condition. Farmers for miles around report crops profitable this year, and the stores have taken in much additional business as well. October freight receipts are said to exceed \$10,000.

The greater part of the amount was paid by farmers and stockmen. Last year the receipts for October were scarcely one-seventh that amount. Railroad activity has been great, and Airlie has been pleased with a new depot.

Farmers have found clover a crop well suited to this section of Polk county, and, although the prices for the seed were lower this fall than for a good many seasons, much more will be planted next spring, so the growers say. T. R. Cook, north of Airlie received \$1500 worth of clover seed from a field of 18 acres.

Airlie schools have been made much better. The grade school has an increased enrollment and a high school has been started that promises to grow in numbers rapidly.
