

COUNTY BUDGET

NOTICE.

Pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 234, General Laws of Oregon, 1913, notice is hereby given that the County Court of Polk County, Oregon, will meet in the Circuit Court room at the Court House, in the City of Dallas, Oregon, on Monday, the 29th day of December, 1913, at the hour of 10 o'clock A. M. of said day, and at the said time and place opportunity will be given for a full and complete discussion of the estimate of the amount of money proposed to be raised by taxation for the ensuing year as published herewith, by any taxpayer subject to such tax levy when made, in favor of or against any proposed tax levies.

The County Court has prepared and submits the following: An estimate of the amount required for each department of county government, county office or county officer or employee, including those whose salaries are fixed by statute, for the improvement and maintenance of public highways, roads, bridges, the construction, operation and maintenance of each public utility; an estimate of the probable receipts of the county from sources other than direct taxation upon the real and personal property in the county during the period for which such tax is to be levied, and the amount of balances on hand in the funds of the county at the time the levy will be made.
