NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS

Your attention is directed to the following changes made by the 1913 Session Laws relative to the payment of taxes:

The County Treasurer is made collector of taxes until they become delinquent—and after delinquency the Sheriff is made collector thereof. Taxes legally levied shall be paid before the 1st day of April; provided that one-half the tax on any particular piece of property may be paid before April 1st and the remaining half of such tax be paid prior to the 1st day of September following. On such second half, however, the penalty of one cent per month is added after April 1st.

No rebate is allowed. On all taxes unpaid on and after April 1st a penalty of one per cent per month is added.

All taxes remaining unpaid on the 1st day of September shall become delinquent and there shall be charged and collected a penalty of 10 per cent and interest at the rate of 12 per cent per annum from date of delinquency until payment is made. On and after October 1st the Sheriff shall issue certificates of delinquency bearing interest at the rate of 15 per cent.

Tax rolls will be in the hands of Treasurer for collection of taxes on or about February 12th. Definite announcement will be made later. Remember that to avoid the penalty payment must be made before April 1st.
