Army of I. W. W. Fed and Sent South From Independence.

Independence, Oregon, January 14.—(Special).—An army of 30 I. W. W. arrived here from Salem Wednesday and feasted on a "Mulligan" stew, the material for which was provided by the city. The more or less delectable conglomeration of everything, and some more, was prepared for consumption by the hobos themselves. They later left on orders of the city officials.

The men are a part of those deported from Salem earlier this week and they said they crossed the Willamette River by mistake, not knowing they were traveling toward Independence.

Warning of the approach of the army had been sent to the city officials by Thomas Fennell, of Orville Station, on the Oregon Electric line. A crowd of business men and citizens met the invaders at the ferry.

The army marched to the main business street, where it rested while the leader tried to arrange for food. Failing to induce citizens to provide meals, the leader appealed to the city and enough meat and vegetables were provided for a "Mulligan."

The men resumed their march south at 2 o'clock.

It is reported that a second army of 100 men is approaching this city. The Mayor says no food will be provided and the men will be escorted through the city and compelled to keep going.

Game Law Violated.

Steve Selemes, John Lopus and Tom Likay were arrested near Derry and brought before Justice Holman, Tuesday, charged with violating Section 28 of the Fish and Game laws of Oregon.

The complaint was drawn by District Attorney Upjohn, and the men pleaded "guilty" and were fined \$25 each and their guns were confiscated, two shot guns and a rifle.

The section violated reads as follows:

Sec. 28. (a) It shall be unlawful for any unnaturalized, foreign born person within the State of Oregon, who has not legally declared his intention to become a citizen of the United States, to hunt, trap, or angle for, or kill or take any of the wild animals, wild birds, or fish of this State, or to have in possession any shotgun, rifle or any firearms, while in the field or forest, or in any tent, car or camp in the State without first having secured a gun license from the State Board of Fish and Game Commissioners, paying therefor the sum of \$25; provided, that nothing in this section shall be construed to allow such unnaturalized person to hunt or angle without first having obtained a regular hunter's or angler's license.

(b) And it shall be unlawful for any such unnaturalized person to apply for, secure, or in any way attempt to secure a hunter's or angler's license without having in possession at the time of applying for or securing such hunter's or angler's license, a gun license, as provided by this section. (Laws 1913, Chapter 232.)

Simplified Spelling.

It has struck Oregon, that is, the simplified spelling. A number of letters received the past week, shows that the suggestion as given by a number of school superintendents of the middle states is being put into use. Some of the most striking examples of the 300 words that have been recommended are the following and these words are being used daily in newspapers and classes:—blunsh, blushed; earnest, earressed; chap, clapped; elipt, clipped; compest, compest; confest, confessed; erost, erossed; chrust, crushed; dash, dashed; dipt, dipped; discust, discussed; drust, dressed; fantom, phantom; gazel, gazelle; hiecup, hicough; kist, kissed; mama, mamma; rime, rhyme; thd, though; wo, woe. The first word of the pair is simplified.
