The Chicago Specialist
Returned From Eastern Oregon
To The
Willamette Valley
Will Stay in Dallas
During the Spring.

Dr. Toel, who was in Dallas last
Spring and Summer to introduce his
electrical bloodless operations for
cancers and tumors, and his other
electrical, physiological treatments of

from Eastern Oregon, where he went
