New Electric Plant to Start.

The new electric power and lighting plant built by J. C. Robertson, on his place five miles south of Falls City, is ready for operation. Mr. Robertson is making arrangements to have a public celebration, picnic, and "turning on the light," on May 1. The pupils of Ronco, Pedee, and other schools, and the public generally are invited to attend the doings.

The plant is built under an 80-foot head of water, and has a capacity of 20-horse power.

The water for power comes from mountain streams that have heretofore been considered too insignificant to be given names. The new works will be used to operate a cream separator, feed and meal grinders, and other purposes requiring power, besides generating light for the homes, barns and highways of the neighborhood.

Mr. Robertson's place is on the Pedee road, and is not now accessible by auto, but could soon be made passable by the use of a road drag. His new enterprise will further emphasize the need of improving the Pedee road.

Mr. Robertson has shown what can be done by an intelligent, determined man, under difficulties that would seem unsurmountable by the average human.—Falls City News.

Prize Fight Case Thrown Out.

Tillamook, Oregon, April 16.—Judge Webster Holmes in the Circuit Court here held that the Legislature has failed to specifically state of what, under the law, a prizefight consists, and decided that the anti-prize fight law of Oregon is defective. As a result County Attorney Gersoni moved a dismissal of four indictments charging prize fighting, found by the recent grand jury. The indictments were against Roy Saling, Adolph Richter, Charles Saling and James A. White, who were charged with aiding and abetting a prizefight at Cloverdale on April 4th. Two of the cases came up on demurrers, and the court decided that, as the law did not specifically state of what a prize fight consists, the demurrers would have to be sustained, as it was not the province of the court to legislate a definition into a criminal statute. The court stated the Supreme Court had decided that an indictment could not be brought upon a common law offense.

Mrs. Faist, of Dallas, had for six years been troubled with a tumor on the left thigh, which since a year had caused her much anxiety on account of a dull aching pain. Dr. Toel informed her that the growth was not malignant at the present time, but as his long years' experience had taught him that this particular form of tumor will often degenerate into cysto-sarcoma, a form of cancer, he advised Mrs. Faist to have it removed before it might become malignant, especially as the pain was a suspicious sign.

Mrs. Faist consequently made an appointment to be operated upon Tuesday of this week, and after visiting her daughter in Corvallis, returned to Dr. Toel's office on the day named for the operation.

Dr. Toel removed the entire tumor without the loss of a single drop of blood and with little pain by means of one of his electric operations. As soon as the operation was over, Mrs. Faist declared that she was entirely free from pain.

Mrs. Faist then had the doctor remove the small tumor on the point of her nose by means of the same process, which was accomplished in a few seconds, the entire growth being destroyed by the electric current.
