"He was taken over to Mossdale with a lot of shiny quarters, while I came on here to Centerville, where I've certainly spent a busy six months. I heard he was sent out of Mossdale to a Chicago mail order house to pay for four pounds of tea—the kind that doesn't taste so good somehow as you thought it would when you read about it in the catalog."

"And how I've worked since we separated! This is a live little city as you'll soon learn for yourself. I've moved about so much I call myself 'The Rolling Dollar.'"

"Every stop to think how many bills a dollar can roll out flat, all ready for the 'Bills Paid' file—that is, if the people will only keep track of him and hold him within reach in their own community?"

"Why, dozens of times I've been in the same trouser pocket twice in the same week. You see, Centerville folks spend their money here in town. Perhaps that is one reason why it has doubled in eight years."

"Just the other day I was paid out by a farmer on a grocery bill. I didn't stay in that till very long, for it was payday and the delivery boy got me. The next morning I went into a clothing store. The clothing store man took me home and I had almost a day's rest. Then his wife bought two settings of fancy eggs from that same farmer, and I went back to that house. The farmer's wife spent me for some dry goods right away, and the next day I went to a carpenter who was putting a new partition in the store. The carpenter used me for part of his rent money, and I laid in the bank for an hour. Then the minister drew me out when he cashed a small check, and in his home I rubbed up against a shiny \$5 gold piece a bridegroom gave him."

"The man who sold the horse took me to the planing mill, and I heard him say he could square up now that he had sold the horse. I went out of the mill Saturday afternoon as wages, and on Monday I landed in a shoe store. The man who carried me there said the boss had given him the raise he had been promised, because business was looking up now. At any rate, the shoe man had a new show window put in his store, and I helped pay for that. Right away I was dropped in the cash register of a restaurant, and then back here to the grocery store. Well, we'll see one another often I guess, you're bound to move around in Centerville."

"How do I know I'll never see my brother again? Why, did you ever see any of the money that is sent to Chicago or Buffalo or St. Louis or New York coming back this way? The mail order houses don't pay anything from this district—their business is to sell to the folks here and then let them rustle around as best they can to sell what they grow or make. The mail order house doesn't help you any to get the money, but it will help you to get rid of it by buying in larger quantities than you need and sometimes buying things you can't afford just because the picture in the catalog looks so nice. 'Brother probably went to pay for a street improvement in Buffalo or he helped—just a little bit—to pay for a dinner in some Chicago grill. It's good-bye when you go there.'"

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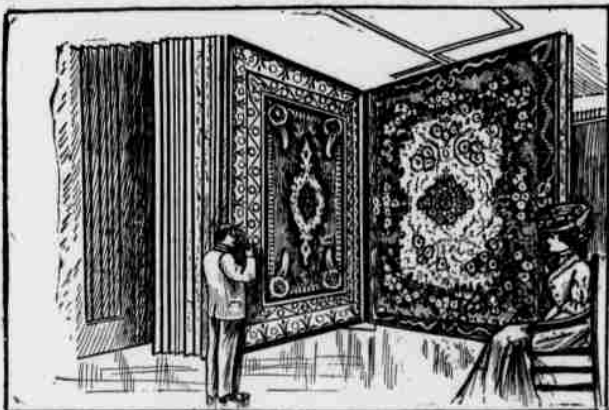
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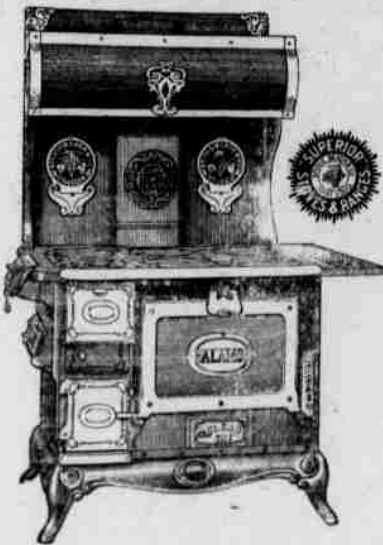

SOMEWHAT PREVIOUS

The coming back of disappointed men who thought to make homes in Canada, is a reminder that while there are good lands in central and north-western Canada, it is too soon to hope for a great farming country in British Columbia, for there it is a land of glaciers that are moving irresistibly to the sea, and while a part of them have done their work and left soil for men to cultivate, it is too soon to go there, for the frosts and storms are sure to be encountered by those who would make their permanent home there. J. Pentony, a Missourian, who was in Dallas this week viewing the country, has but recently returned from an extensive trip through Canada, and while not disappointed in its possibilities for money-

making the country did not appeal to him as a place of residence. Yet, notwithstanding the rigors of the climate, he tells of a wagon trip some eight hundred miles in length, at the end of which one may find a paradise as regards climate and soil, the wonderfulness of which few are aware. The scenery of the route, as described by this informant, is grander than ever before seen on this continent, but the journey is long and tedious, not to say dangerous.

British Columbia is between the glacial period and the uncovering of a new world. The warm waterways of the Pacific were pumped by sun beams, loaded on clouds wafted shoreward, where the cold would seize them and compress their moisture into crystals, and thus be heaped up, age

after age until the whole gloomy area was an unbroken field of ice. That was the preparation ordered by the Infinite, in whose mind was the knowledge then that after uncounted ages a race of beings called men would appear there and want soil out of which to raise their bread. There was no way to get the soil save to grind it off the mountain peaks, no agent to do that work save the glacier. So it was called up from the ocean and fell in crystals, and this was continued until its weight was sufficient to perform the work required; then it was set in flow. But its work is not completed, and it is too early to trust that soil to raise bread. The transformation is still in progress; it is a wonderful place for the artist and the poet, but it is yet unsafe for prose-

cuting agricultural pursuits. Any one wishing to secure a farm in Canada should go east of the mountains, or north where the land falls off in gentle slopes toward the Arctic Circle. In this section, deep into the wilds, is said to be a wonderfully productive land, with climatic conditions that are surprisingly salubrious.

According to the federal forest service the average annual loss from forest fires is about seventy lives and \$25,000,000. If the cost of crops, buildings, stock and young trees were included the loss would be many millions more.

Feed plenty of charcoal, as it is one of the best things for keeping the poultry healthy.
