

**WM. GRIER IS ENDORSED****STRONG RECOMMENDATIONS REGARDLESS OF PARTY.****Falls City and Independence Support Movement Started by Dallas Business Men.**

The movement started by the republican business men of Dallas on Monday to secure William T. Grier of Falls City as a candidate upon the republican ticket for the office of representative from the Eleventh Representative district, comprising the county of Polk, is creating enthusiasm throughout the county. **BOOSTER CLUB MEETS.****Attendance Comparatively Light, But Enthusiasm Is Great.**

**PROHIB OMIT NOTHING****PLATFORM SHOWS PARTY FAVORS MANY THINGS.****Polk County Delegates Attend and Participate in Convention's Deliberations.**

Messrs. Chester P. Gates and J. W. Thomas returned yesterday from Portland, where they attended the prohibition convention as delegates from Polk county. The convention nominated H. S. Stine of Medford for United States senator; W. S. U'Ren for governor; B. Lee Paget for state treasurer; William H. Trindell for attorney-general; W. H. Meredith for congressman from the first district; and endorsed a bunch of the other candidates.

The platform adopted places the prohibition party on record in favor of the safeguarding of the initiative, referendum and recall; abolition of useless commissions; raising of salary and efficiency standards of public employees to those of private business; gubernatorial veto on separate appropriation items; semi-annual payment of taxes; cooperation of state and national governments in expansion of rural credits and irrigation and development projects; conservation of public resources and surveys of same; state and county cooperation for better roads.

The platform shows the party in favor of additional legislation for the suppression of traffic in girls; proportional representation; the proposed amendment empowering the governor to remove from office delinquent district attorneys, sheriffs and constables and the proposed prohibition amendment to the state constitution. The party further declares against use of the public funds for private or religious purposes and advocates the repeal of
