

## With Polk County's Leading Breeders of Fancy Live Stock

Mr. W. O. Morrow, who is located seven miles from Dallas on the Salem road, has in his La Creole herd of A. J. C. Jersey stock that is hard to beat anywhere. The herd is headed by "Oxford You'll Do, Junior," imported in 1911. This animal is solid color, with a good masculine head; wide between the eyes; straight, strong back, and with a fine bull. His sire, "Oxford You'll Do P. S. 4975 H. C.," first Parish prize (with get) over Jersey, April, 1911. He is a full brother to Oxford Knight, sire Oxford Maric C. of M.; Oct. 1910, 1 lb. 6 1/2 oz. in one day, 173 days in milk. His grand sire, "Gambogis Knight P. 3645 H. C.," is the sire of many show-ring winners, and butter-producing cows, and considered one of the very best bulls that ever left the Island. "Oxford You'll Do, Jr.," is proving a show-ring winner, and he has a lot of nice calves coming on. His importer says his dam on the Island was one of the greatest cows he ever saw. This bull won first prize and was Junior Champion at the Oregon State fair in 1912; first prize, Senior calf in 1911, in a class of thirteen.

Mr. Morrow's herd comprises some of the very best cows in the state among them being the following:

**Ciecro's Oxford Extra.** Age three years; milk, 7379 pounds, 8 ounces; butter, 453 pounds, 15 ounces. Sire, Golden Ciecro.

**Morrow's Select.** Milk in one year, 11857 pounds, 12 ounces; butter 828 pounds, 14 ounces. This cow during her test was on the fair circuit five weeks, won the butter test at the Oregon State Fair, 1911; also produced more butter fat at the Washington State Fair in 1911 than any other cow. Record for two days, 5.18 pounds. Below are two of her daughters, 7 years old, sire Golden Glow Chief.

**La Creole's Carnation.** Milk, 8101 pounds, 6 ounces; butter, 575 pounds, 10 ounces, in 345 days. This cow is expected to make 900 pounds of butter in another year, four years old.

**La Creole's Select Rose.** Milk in one year, 8513 pounds, 12 ounces; butter 589 pounds, seven ounces, three years old.

**La Creole's Winnie.** Milk in 334 days 5673 pounds, 12 ounces; butter, 436 pounds, 5 ounces; two years old.

**La Creole's Darkey.** Milk in 363 days, 6142 pounds, 9 ounces; butter, 398 pounds, 13 ounces; two years old.

**La Creole's Rose.** Milk in 328 days, 6167 pounds, 4 ounces; butter, 393 pounds, 5 ounces; two years old.

**La Creole's Amy.** Milk in 334 days, 5180 pounds, 14 ounces; butter, 357 pounds, 4 ounces; 2 years old. Amy's Chief 74154, sire of the six preceding cows.

**Golden Lady Nancy V.** Milk in 347 days, 6721 pounds, 12 ounces; butter, 414 pounds, 7 ounces. Sire, Golden Reminiscence 72689. Three years old.

**La Creole's Nancy.** Milk in 335 days, 5626 pounds, 3 ounces; butter, 322 pounds, 9 ounces. Age, 19 months. Sire, Golden Borello 73449; dam above.

**Fern's Lass of S. B.** Milk in 323 days, 5866 pounds; butter, 349 pounds, 3 ounces. Age 2 years. Sire, Fern's Prize 63733.

**Golden Tulip of S. B.** Milk in 295 days, 4501 pounds, 6 ounces; butter, 323 pounds, 3 ounces. Sire, Eminent 2414 79658. Two years old.

**Gray Fox's Miss Autumn.** Milk in 359 days 6226 pounds, 12 ounces; butter, 427 pounds, 12 ounces; 4 years old. Sire, Flying Fox's Gray Fox 61437.

**Ciecro's Dorothy.** Milk in 11 months, 6843 pounds; butter, 491 pounds. During test she had a congested udder, which no doubt reduced her more than 100 pounds of butter. Age, 3 years. Sire, Golden Ciecro 86272.

**Lackiamute Jersey Herd.** Frank Langhary, proprietor of Lackiamute Farm, Monmouth, has eight of his Jersey herd that have finished a year's official test and all qualified. Fadoma's Pansie Model produced 620 pounds of butter and Melia Ann's Golden Lass, beginning at twenty-five months, produced 412 pounds. Five of the eight produced over five hundred pounds each. He has seven on test now, all two-year-olds but one. Three of them have already qualified, with four months yet to go. He expects to show a small herd, mostly young stock, at the State Fair this fall. Mr. Langhary has a very nice lot of bull calves from the cows that have completed their tests. Two of these are just past a year, while others are old enough for light service and he is offering them below their value. His old bull is looking fit and fine.

**Pure Jersey Herd.** H. E. Bessett is using for a herd bull Violet's Noble Peer, by Noble Peer and out of Imp, Rover's Violet. Mr. Bessett has a good herd of grade and pure bred Jerseys. Goldie Bates, one of the best from the Miller herd, has milked forty-six pounds a day on ordinary feed. Mr. Bessett now has fifteen registered Jerseys and intends in time to have only pure bred animals.

**Hermosa Vista Testing.** C. P. Hembree, proprietor of Hermosa Vista Stock Farm, near Monmouth, Oregon, reports the sale of the Jersey bull, Oakland's Sultan of Oregon to Hughes

Bros. of Coos county. This bull was imported in dam, his sire has twelve Register of Merit daughters and his dam, Marigold of Riverside, has a record of 743 pounds of butter in a year. Mr. Hembree now has eight cows on test. One of them, Stockwell's Birdie, imported in dam, a two-year-old by Stockwell, is producing almost forty pounds of milk a day and promises to make a great record for her age. Another, a heifer by Mareus, tests six per cent and gives over thirty pounds, and the herd generally is starting off well.

Mr. Hembree very modestly claims not to be a first-class dairyman, but says others would make larger records by giving closer attention, whereas a good part of his time is given to the hogs he raises, buys and sells. Mr. Hembree expects, if nothing happens to interfere, to show a small herd at the State Fair this fall. Old Rochelle's Noble is still looking and acting well and Noble Peer's Jewel, by Noble Peer, dam Jewel by Clear Creek Fox, that won first prize as a calf at the State Fair last fall, third at the National Dairy Congress at Waterloo, Iowa, second at the National Dairy Show at Chicago and first at the Pacific International Stock Show at North Portland, is still showing the wonderful quality that made her winner last year.

**Will Make An Exhibit.** A new firm of Guernsey breeders that expects to exhibit at the Oregon State Fair this fall is Chase Bros., of Independence. They brought twelve head of registered cows from Wisconsin last fall. Several of these go back to Sheet Anchor, grandsire of May Rilma, that has recently broken the world's butter record for any breed and all are bred much along the same lines, with advanced register ancestry showing in their pedigrees. A beautiful young cow is Galadaya, by Paul of Fox Run, dam Pauline Hays of Meadowbrook, by Preton's Count, grandson of Sheet Anchor, sire of ten advanced register daughters. A very fine bull just a year old, of the Glenwood line of breeding, heads the herd. The dam, Elma's Ethel, finished a year's test as a two-year-old with 490 pounds of fat, or 576.4 pounds of eighty-five per cent butter.

**Lady's Pet Improving.** F. E. Lynn, the Perrydale Jersey breeder, reports that his cow, Lady's Pet of Kihourm, for which he paid \$600, has milked much better the past season than the one before; in fact she has done a little the best of anything in the herd. Her second bull calf by Mr. Lynn's bull, Cowslip's Ashley, is more showy than her first one, by Donative Donga. His young bull, St. Mawes' Golden Poppy, son of St. Mawes' Poppy, with a record of 942 pounds of butter, is growing and looking well. He has a good capacity, straight lines and a mellow hide. Mr. Lynn will begin official testing again this fall, mostly heifers. He regrets that he did not test Lady's Pet during this period of lactation.

**Stock Is Doing Well.** Guy Hewitt of Monmouth has ten of his Jersey herd on official test, besides five that finished before the first of the year. The first three daughters of his bull, Pendo Lad, are on test, each with her first calf and they promise to produce 450 to 500 pounds of butter each. As they have been on test nine months their year's production can be closely estimated. None of them will run a full year, as they were all in milk some time before the test was begun. Mr. Hewitt reports all his stock doing well and crop prospects excellent. He expects to show a herd at the State Fair this fall, with Golden Fern's Noble, grand champion at the Portland Show last winter, at the head.

**Hog to Show Hogs.** R. W. Hogg, of West Salem, will show Poland Chinas at the State Fair as usual this fall. F. M.'s Darkness, a sow that has shown every year for three years, besides raising two litters of pigs each year, looks as if she could still continue to win in both lines. Charecol Again, an eight months old gilt, looks like a coming champion and Mr. Hogg's small herd is all doing well.—Rural Spirit.

**Places New Order.** John Palmer of Independence has an order in with Harry West for two island Jersey cows. He has a very nice heifer by Noble Peer that, he reports, after milking eight months, is still giving twenty-five pounds a day. She is a show heifer, too, and if the cows get through all right he expects to show at the State Fair this fall.

**Cooley Is Optimistic.** Spring Valley farmers are going into the stock business more every season, according to H. W. Cooley, who is running two big ranches in that district. Returning from Seattle, Washington, after an extended investigation tour of dairy cattle, he states that he has purchased three prize winning dairy animals, all of which will be entered in the fairs about the state, says The Statesman.

Mr. Cooley is very enthusiastic

over the stock conditions of the state and northwest. "The field for stock work here is immense," said he. Men who have left the grain business and gone into stock raising report that they are more than satisfied. Hogs and cattle seem to be the main animals which the valley farmers are dealing with. With grain and hay crops of exceptional value at their very doors the Willamette valley farmers are placed in a position where it is possible to turn out some of the very best stock ever grown," he said in closing.

Vetch hay that was pastured to the limit in April and eaten to the ground had made a growth of from four to five feet in the intervening three months. The growth is strong and sturdy and the vetch will make excellent silage as well as green feed. Other crops are coming on in the same manner. In addition to grain and stock work, Mr. Cooley is going into the berry business. Strawberries are showing up well in Spring Valley as are all the other crops. Farmers are cooperating and uniting forces so as to make as big a showing this fall as possible.

**Will Show at State Fair 21st.** Thos. Brunk, the veteran proprietor of Spring Brook Stock Farm, who was last winter elected one of the vice-presidents of the Poland China Record Association, says all the stock, sheep, goats and hogs, are doing very well. Mr. Brunk has some extremely nice litters of Poland Chinas and will show at the State Fair as usual unless the young stock is sold before that time.

**HOP PICKING MACHINE UP.**

**Livesley & Co. Having Labor Saving Invention Installed Near Salem.**

A hop picking machine is being erected within sight of Salem. T. A. Livesley & Co. are having one of these ingenious labor-saving inventions installed on their large hop ranch north of this city. The machine is a mammoth affair and will be housed in a building 120 feet long. It will require forty men to operate it and will pick 1200 baskets of hops each day when under full operation. The machine is a California product, having been perfected by the E. Clement Horst Hop company of Sacramento. A representative of the Horst company is now at Lake Brook farm installing the machine in order that it may be ready to harvest the crop of this ranch next September.—Salem Statesman.
