SISTERS ARE VINDICATED.

Supreme Court Decision Gratifying to Oregon Catholics.

The recent decision of the Supreme Court in favor of the Benedictine Sister at Mt. Angel will be gratifying news to Catholics and non-Catholics alike throughout the state of Oregon, where these Sisters have labored in the upbuilding of character for the last thirty-two years. In that time no word of criticism has come from the many who had dealings with the Sisters until August 1, 1913, when J. E. Hosmer, editor of the Silverton Journal, began the publication of scurrilous articles defaming the character of the Benedictine Sisters.

The incident which furnished Mr. Hosmer material upon which to base his attack was the act of Miss Mary Lasannen, a Finn about thirty years of age, who left the convent at Mt. Angel after having been in that institution five months as an aspirant to membership in the Sisterhood and went to Silverton about five miles from Mt. Angel. This Miss Lasannen had of her own free will asked on January 19, 1913, permission to come to the convent for the purpose of entering. The Mother Superior after making the usual inquiries accepted Miss Lasannen in good faith. For five months Miss Lasannen remained in the convent enjoying all the privileges and protection offered prospective members of the community. During this time the lady in question repeatedly expressed her desire of becoming a nun and when the time of her probation was ended indicated that she was in perfect good faith by formally petitioning to be invested with the garb of the Order. The ceremony took place June 24, 1913, and on June 26, 1913, just fifty hours later, Miss Lasannen, wearing the garb, took her departure as above stated.

J. E. Hosmer, editor of the Silverton Journal, in the issue of August 1, 1913, opened his attack on the Benedictine Sisters, of Mt. Angel. The following week he reprinted the same in pamphlet form and sold it at ten cents a copy. A storm of indignation arose at these false and shameless accusations, which resulted in J. E. Hosmer's being arrested for criminal libel. The state of Oregon then took things in hand. At the preliminary hearing, Hosmer was bound over to the grand jury. The grand jury, after investigating the case, indicted him for criminal libel. On October 30th and 31st, the trial came off in the circuit court at Salem. Results—the editor failed to

produce a single witness; and failed to prove that Miss Lasannen had signed her name to a single word of all the abominable lies he had printed against the Sisters. After the trial lasted two days, the non-Catholic jury, in less than three minutes brought in a verdict against the editor of "Guilty of Criminal Libel." The editor upon receiving his sentence appended to the Supreme Court. Yesterday, Chief Justice McBride of the Supreme Court sustained the decision of the circuit court, completely vindicating the innocence of the Benedictine Sisters at Mt. Angel.

FREE ELECTRIC FAN SERVICE.

But Only Indigent Sick Are Entitled to Receive Benefit.

The free electric fan service for the benefit of the indigent sick which has been in effect at all electric properties operated by H. M. Bylesby and company, during the last three summers, will be renewed this summer, according to Manager Martin of the Oregon Power company. The offer the company makes in effect is, that electric fans and where necessary the current to operate will be furnished to persons seriously ill who are unable to pay for the service. The only conditions are that the attending physician must certify to the reasonable necessity for fan service and to the patient's inability to afford it. The offer, of course, applies where the sick room is within reach of the company's lines.

"The reason for making conditions of any kind is for the obvious purpose of protecting the free electric fan offer for the use of those who really need it and cannot afford it," said Manager Martin. It is a charitable proposition and not in any way allied with efforts to obtain additional business on the part of the company. No hard and fast rules are enforced regarding the free service, our aim being to make it do as much good as possible. During the summer there are always cases where the use of an electric fan greatly improves the condition of the patient, and sometimes represents the narrow margin between life and death. It has been asserted that this free fan service is offered to obtain favorable advertising for the company. In reply to this I would say merely, that the service cannot be offered without a certain degree of publicity inasmuch as the public must know of the offer in order to take advantage of it."

Mulkey's Popularity Shown.

B. F. Mulkey, formerly of Polk, from which county he served eight years in the state senate, and where he was twice elected county clerk, has just been elected a member of the Medford school board, receiving a majority of 500 over his opponents. He was pledged to progressive policies in public school education.

Sheriff Bothered by Lice.

Sheriff John M. Grant has been busily engaged a portion of this week fighting lice. The lice are in his hopyard, and in order to eliminate the pests, spraying has been resorted to. This, he believes, will save to him a full crop.
