

CITY COUNCIL DOINGS

POWELL TRACT TAKEN OVER FOR FAIR PURPOSES.

Arrangements Are Perfected, and Rock Crusher Will Be Started Within a Short Time.

The council, at an adjourned session last night, unanimously adopted a resolution authorizing the purchase of the Rowell tract of sixteen acres for fair and park purposes at a cost of \$5,000, bonds to this amount having been voted at the recent special election. The committee appointed a week ago to confer with the fair board had discharged that duty and recommended that the deal be consummated forthwith that the grounds be made available for use this fall.

Property owners on Ash, east of Stamp, and on Academy, between Main and Jefferson, waived the right to remonstrate against street improvements, and these two blocks were ordered improved, the street commissioner to do the grading.

The council arranged for starting work at the rock quarry. It authorized Mr. Stewart to construct a washer and to make needed repairs, and also bought forty cords of wood from Mr. Dunn at \$2.40 per cord. Alderman Hayter called attention to the fact that during the gathering at the Armory Sunday night the north exit had remained locked, and suggested that on such occasions the marshal should see that the door was unlocked. The officer was so instructed.

The street commissioner was instructed to inspect all sidewalks in the city, and to order such repairs as, in his judgment, were necessary.

The engineer will have a room in the city hall building as soon as one can be arranged by Alderman Westover, who was authorized by the aldermanic body to partition a room off the fire department's quarters on the first floor at an estimated cost of \$50.

Messrs. Fenton, Soehren and Guy were named as peace officers during the chautauqua.

Numerous complaints having been registered with aldermen about the existence of nuisances, a committee will make a thorough inspection of the city and abate them by compelling connections with sewers.

The committee appointed to visit the State Insane asylum and investigate its septic tank, reported that it had done so, and had found it most satisfactory. Mr. Strang, the builder, will visit Dallas in the near future and view the situation here.

The council adjourned to meet on Tuesday, June 30.

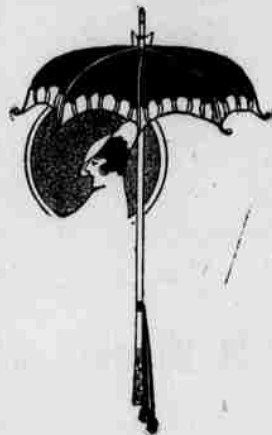
