

DEFEATED BY SHERIDAN

YAMHILLERS TAKE FOURTH GAME OF THE SERIES.

Final Contest for Championship May Be on Neutral Grounds for Large Purse.

Before one of the largest crowds that has gathered to witness a baseball game in the valley this year, Sheridan on Sunday defeated the Dallas aggregation at Sheridan by the score of 4 to 3. The game was replete with splendid plays, and "rag-chewing" was conspicuous by its absence. Both teams played the errorless ball. Sheridan made all its runs in the fourth inning, when Tuerek walked one man, who, by a series of hard luck plays on the part of Dallas, was allowed to score on a felder's choice; two men then got on, and "Frisco" Edwards, Sheridan's McMinville star, eluded the ball over the fence for a home run, making a total of four runs for the inning. This was the only inning in which Sheridan had a chance of scoring. Dallas made two of its runs in the third and one in the seventh. Tuerek, the Oregon star, struck out 13 men, and walked two, and allowed but three hits. Fox, imported by Sheridan from Portland, proved an easy mark for the Dallas hitters, and was replaced in the fifth by Foster. Fox walked two men, and allowed six hits. Foster struck out one man, and allowed four hits. The inability of Dallas to bunt its hits accounts for the loss of the game, as it was evident that the Polk county seaters out-played the Sheridan team.

The final game to decide the championship between the two teams will be played in two weeks, the place for giving the exhibition not having been selected as yet. It is thought that either Salem or McMinnville will be selected. The final game will likely be for a purse of \$500, besides gate receipts, and much interest will be taken in it. Both teams will play the same line-up that played in yesterday's game. The game by innings follows:

First inning: Bigbee led off for Dallas. He hit a hot one to L. Knickerbocker, who threw him out at first. Baker walked. Baker took second on a sacrifice hit by Serr, who went out L. Knickerbocker to Nelson. Fenton fled out to Bishop. No hits; no runs.

C. Knickerbocker strikes out. L. Knickerbocker goes out. Tuerek to Fenton. Bishop strikes out. No hits; no runs.

Second inning: Toozie hits safely for two balls. Myers goes out, Fox to Nelson. Rice sacrifices to Nelson. Toozie advancing to third. Boydston pops out to Nelson. Toozie dying on third. One hit; no runs.

Nelson goes out on a long fly to Center. Toozie grabbing the ball. Edwards strikes out. Goodwin strikes. No hits; no runs.

Third inning: Tuerek hits safely for one base. Bigbee hits a hot one to Payne. Payne tags Tuerek out at second. Bigbee getting first. Bigbee steals second. Baker sacrifices, advancing Bigbee to third. Baker going out Payne to Nelson. Serr hits safely, scoring Bigbee. Fenton hits safely for one base, scoring Serr. Fenton going to third. Toozie caught out stealing second. Four hits; two runs.

Payne strikes out. Matchenbacher strikes out. Fox strikes out. No hits; no runs.

Fourth inning: Myers goes out Payne to Nelson. Rice hits safely for one base. Boydston walks. Rice going to second. Tuerek hits a long fly to center, going out. Rice advancing to third on the hit. Tuerek getting credit for a sacrifice hit. Boydston steals second. Bigbee hits a hot one to short, but Payne makes a hard stop, and catches Bigbee out at first. One hit; no runs.

C. Knickerbocker walks. Knickerbocker steals second. Serr lets a bad throw go past him, and Knickerbocker goes to third. L. Knickerbocker strikes out. Bishop hits a hot one to Fenton. Fenton chooses to catch C. Knickerbocker at the plate. Play is a close one, but umpire declares Knickerbocker safe, scoring Sheridan's first run. Bishop safe at first. Nelson hits safely for one base, advancing Bishop to third. Edwards, with two balls and two strikes on him, eludes the ball squarely, and it soared over the fence, making a home run, and scoring Bishop and Nelson, besides himself. Goodwin strikes out. Paynes goes out on a pop-up to Baker. Two hits; four runs.

Fifth inning: Foster replaced Fox as pitcher for Sheridan. Baker pops up as a fowl which was taken into camp by Motchenbacher. Serr strikes out. Fenton goes out on a long fly to left field. No hits; no runs.

Motchenbacher goes out on a pop-up to Tuerek. Foster strikes out. C. Knickerbocker walks. Knickerbocker walks into a trap in trying to steal second, and goes out Serr to Bigbee. No hits; no runs.

Sixth inning: Toozie goes out, L. Knickerbocker to Nelson. Myers pops out to L. Knickerbocker. Rice goes out, Foster to Nelson. No hits; no runs.

L. Knickerbocker hits to Fenton, Fenton touching him out. Bishop hits for two bases. Nelson pops out to Boydston. Edwards goes out, Payne to Fenton. Bishop dying on second. One hit; no runs.

Seventh inning: Boydston goes out, L. Knickerbocker to Nelson. Tuerek hits safely for two bases.

Tuerek goes third on a passed ball. Bigbee hits safely for one base, scoring Tuerek. Bigbee steals second. Baker strikes out. Serr hit a safe one, Bigbee going to third and trying to score. Bigbee caught out at the plate, on a perfect throw by Edwards from center field. Three hits; one run.

Winegardner replaces Goodwin in Right field. Winegardner pops out to Baker. Payne pops out to Bigbee. Motchenbacher strikes out. No hits; no runs.

Eighth inning: Fenton flies out to C. Knickerbocker. Toozie goes out Bishop to Nelson. Myers flies out to C. Knickerbocker. No hits; no runs. Barhan replaces Rice in right field. Foster strikes out. C. Knickerbocker strikes out. L. Knickerbocker fans the atmosphere three times, but Tuerek loses the strike out when Serr drops ball. Serr throws Knickerbocker out at first. No hits; no runs.

Ninth inning: Barhan goes out L. Knickerbocker to Nelson. Boydston hits safely for one base. Tuerek flies out to Edwards. Bigbee goes out Foster to Nelson, ending the game. One hit; no runs.

Total: Dallas, 10 hits; 3 runs. Sheridan, 3 hits; 4 runs. Barhan went into right-field in place of Rice in the eighth. Foster replaced Fox for Sheridan in the fifth. Winegardner replaced Goodwin in right field in the 7th. Umpire, White. Time of game: 1 hour, 40 minutes.

NEW OPENING FOR GEORGE.

Why Not Secure Appropriation for Historic La Creole River?

Why not pray our representatives in congress to secure a governmental appropriation for the improvement of the La Creole river? Three of four millions of dollars would undoubtedly suffice to improve the stream to a navigable depth from its mouth to Dallas, and possibly a few rods beyond, thus affording this great and growing section water transportation facilities to Eola and into the Willamette. Municipal wharves might then be constructed on the waterfront near the Main street bridge, and the movement of commodities would soon induce the building of great warehouses for the accommodation of goods brought hither from all foreign townships having riparian rights by steamship companies that would speedily become identified with a waterway of far less importance than any other on the Pacific coast.

Now is an opportune time to inaugurate such a movement, as United States Senator Chamberlain is evidently making river and harbor appropriation for Oregon a specialty in connection with divers and sundry other campaign plays, and he couldn't consistently turn down such a weighty proposition as the one here presented for consideration. It might, however, prove better politics to ask governmental aid for the Rieckreiff river, on account of that stream's connection with the early history of Oregon, but in either case the promoters would undoubtedly be assured of encouragement and support. It would have been a pretty feather in the top-piece of "Our George" if he had foreseen what this undertaking would mean to him in Polk county, and had instituted it without this meritorious lurch, but even though it may have been suggested the introduction of a belated resolution to include this spillway in the appropriation bill might have the effect of improving his chances.

NOTICES ARE DESTROYED.

Warnings Posted By Fire Service Torn From Their Place.

"Fire warnings are being torn down along the streams in various places in this and adjacent counties, and unless this vandalism is discontinued the perpetrators of the crime, for crime it is, are going to get into serious trouble," complained Inspector W. V. Fuller in the presence of The Observer's man yesterday. "There is a penalty of not less than \$25 nor more than \$500, or imprisonment of not less than 10 days nor more than three months for this offense, and if the warning notices posted to replace the ones destroyed are disturbed the matter will be fully investigated and the guilty one punished," he continued.

A fortnight since Fire Warden Harris put up a full set of notices, and practically all were destroyed. It is important that these warnings remain in place, and Mr. Fuller purposes seeing to it that they do.

"The only advertising in the world which is on the increase at the present time is newspaper advertising." Newspaper advertising is the thing, according to this authority. "The fact that the big national advertisers are turning to the local papers in preference to the national mediums should point the way to local advertisers. They should follow in the steps of the big fellows if they wish to be successful."

POLK SCHOOL FAIR SET

MANY EXHIBITS PROMISED FOR SEPTEMBER.

More Than \$500 in Prizes to Be Given, and Awards Will Include Trips to State Exhibitions.

Rules and regulations governing the fifth annual school children's fair, to be held in Dallas September 17, 18 and 19, have been sent out to the various districts of Polk county, and the pupils of the various districts are attempting to win first prize for the best school exhibit. In preparing articles to be exhibited each child must do all the work. In gardening the ground may be prepared by someone else, if desired.

In other work the parent may instruct the child how to do the work, but the child must be the one to act. Every boy or girl in the county less than 19 years old is eligible to enter the contest, which will be divided into three classes. Class A will include those between the ages of 14 and 19, class B will include all less than 14 years old, and class C will include those less than 19 years old who have more than five months' training in domestic science of manual arts.

More than \$500 in prizes is to be given at the fair this fall, and the children's department will draw a large part. In special prizes alone they are to receive \$167. The child making the largest exhibit will get \$10, second \$5. The two boys making the highest score on any two projects will be sent to the Oregon State Fair for a week as members of the school camp. The boy or girl making the highest score in each project in each class will receive a one day's trip to the State Fair with expenses paid.

Also the North half of Lot Eight (8) in Block Twelve (12) in the Town of Eola, Polk County, Oregon, otherwise described as beginning at a point 75 feet South 79 degs.
