

In Society Circles

Mr. and Mrs. P. S. Greenwood entertained the members of U. S. Grant post and their wives at their home on Saturday evening, the occasion being Mr. Greenwood's seventy-first birthday. The rooms were artistically decorated with flags, bunting, pictures of noted generals of the civil war, battle scenes and flowers. Commander Greenwood and his wife received the guests with that hearty welcome that makes one feel at home. Music and an address by Comrade Carpenter constituted the principal features of the evening, although Master Palmer, grandson of the host, played a somewhat prominent part when he, during the serving of refreshments, introduced the commander's cavalry sabre, carried through the unpleasantness by the veteran, and directed that his grandpa cut the birthday cake with it. The cake, with its seventy-one small silk flags, was accordingly cut by Mr. Greenwood, after he had saluted the company with the implement of warfare.

Mr. Fred Palmer of Seattle, accompanied by his daughter, Miss Louisa, in a rich voice sang several old favorites, which were greatly enjoyed by those present. Mr. P. S. Greenwood, Jr., accompanied by Miss Palmer, also gave a number of selections which were none the less appreciated. Resolutions of congratulation were read and presented to the commander's wife, after which Post Chaplain Carpenter delivered an eloquent address, recounting the events of the last fifty years of our national life, and ending with the solemn admonition that naturally our last battle would soon be fought. He also admonished the veterans to be ready for the final defeat. After an hour's good cheer the exercises were ended by a feeling prayer by the chaplain. Mr. Greenwood's entire family, except one daughter, who is in the east, was present, and added greatly to the evening's entertainment, which was one continuous round of pleasure.

Chaplain Carpenter's Address.

Comrades: Tonight my mind goes back to over half a century ago, when this fair land of ours was in the throes of treason and rebellion. In a section of this country where the cruel whip of the slave-driver and the auction block confronted four millions of human beings, a plan was matured to disrupt this land, to trample its flag in the dust, and substitute one that would perpetuate the cruelties of African-American slavery. But when this attempt was made Abraham Lincoln called for 75,000 men to preserve this country, handed down to us through the blood of our forefathers. One of this great number was our host and beloved commander, whose hospitality we are now enjoying. Though only a boardless boy he buckled on his sword in defense of his country's flag. We are here with him tonight to recount the days of long ago, when we marched out to the wild music of war.

We were led by commanders who represented to us that we would whip the south back into the union in a few months, that "it would be only a breakfast spell" until we would be home again. But we found a foeman worse of our steel. Notwithstanding the musty spirit that actuated the leaders of these men in their attempt to destroy this union they were men of courage and great endurance, and caused the loss of millions of treasure and thousands of lives of the best blood of this country before they went down in defeat. With our comrades we followed the flag in long marches through swamp and morass, on many bloody battle fields, languished in rebel prison pens where thousands, after torture and starvation, gave up their lives all for love of country.

On the lonely picket post in the dead of night our hearts went out to home and loved ones—wives and sweethearts we had left behind when we marched off to war. Oh, the lonely hours, the many bitter tears that were shed in those lonely vigils. It was then we missed the dear ones. But God in His mercy permitted some of us to return to a united and happy land, and we are here tonight enjoying the hospitality of our comrade and his family. We have the satisfaction that we assisted in making this the greatest and grandest country in the world.

This nation is today a pattern for the rest of the world who are today engaged in the most foolish and cruel war that history has ever recorded; a war where no principle is involved. Our flag waves over a united and happy country, where manhood alone, regardless of color or previous condition, is entitled to its protection. When a foreign nation attempted to deprive our sister republic of Cuba of its freedom, our sons, as their fathers did before them, shouldered their guns and drove the invaders, boots and saddle, from this great American continent. In this our nation covered itself with glory.

But, comrades, our race is nearly run. We are here tonight in this peaceful and happy home, enjoying the blessings of this great country, and it is fitting that we should recount the deeds that made this country what General Washington declared of it, "United We stand, divided we fall." We feel that by our sacrifice we have left a heritage to the generation of today, who will fill our places in the future, and therefore we have not lived in vain. And we hope that when the last battle of life is over we may all meet in that happy land where war will be no more, and God alone is the Great Commander.
