Bonds and Substitutes.

A plan to indent the state with six per cent twenty-five year bonds to create a ten million dollar road fund is not meeting with the rapid progress that its sponsors would like. There is not much weight to arguments against good roads; farmers, manufacturers and merchants are equally benefited by their construction. But the question takes on new significance when the proposition is presented of heavily bonding the state for the very desirable improvement, and the hesitation manifested in some quarters is perhaps very natural. The idea is worthy of the greatest consideration the voters are able to give it; in fact they might profit by waiting until Multnomah county has thoroughly tested the merits of the bonding system, by which a large sum was recently made available for the hard surfacing of her roads.

The state of Washington, taking the lead in road development work, is executing a plan whereby the interest bugaboo on bonds is avoided, and at the same time good roads are constantly being built in all parts of the state. Each legislature appropriates

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sufficient money to cover the budget estimate of the state highway commissioner, adds to it the money raised at different times by the various counties, and continues road work until the next legislature creates a new fund.

Still another plan that has been presented by a few who are opposed to the bond issue is the annual levy of a one mill tax for ten consecutive years. This would bring into the road fund one million dollars each year, the same results would be accomplished in the end, and not much more than half the expense would be entailed. The proposition should be given careful consideration.
