The destruction of human life caused by a warning issued by the game warden urges all sportsmen to use the greatest care to avoid such accidents. The death of Forest Ranger Cabinet National for last year.

was mistaken for a bear hunter, who fired with the intention of being sure what he was shooting. To show that such accidents are not uncommon, the warning is issued to the estimate of the biological department between 150 and 200 persons are annually killed in hunting in this country and that this number is increasing. Furthermore, 15 per cent of all the game in the national forests are killed by careless hunters and other

in national forests, it is pointed out that the best hunting grounds are in the national forests. The number of game animals is increasing on account of the protection from forest fires and the killing which is afforded by the game warden. On many of the forests, elk, mountain sheep and deer are fairly plentiful, and small game is usually abundant.

On mountain lion, and other predators are found on most of the forests and the killing of these animals is encouraged because they are domestic stock and the game animals.

The best indication of a game warden to be in the woods, is the care which is shown in handling firearms and fire.

but the most inexperienced hunter will shoot without getting a view of his game, while the man who takes his campfire escape or who drops a lighted match or a cigarette ashes betrays at once his lack of the fundamental principles of woodcraft.

Each year sees an increase in the number of persons who visit the national forests for hunting and other sports purposes. Every effort is made to encourage this use of the national forests.

"He interested me as much as any student of the Oregon Agricultural College," said Mr. Moore yesterday in commenting on young Cooley's experiments.
