CARS TO BE FULLY LOADED.

F. Agents Receive Orders From

Superintendent F. L. Burkhalter

To prevent the escape each week partly loaded box cars through the eastern gateway Superintendent F. L. Burkhalter of the Southern Pacific railroad company has ordered at all box cars destined to points of the Pacific system must be loaded to weight or space capacity. In his letter to agents Mr. Burkhalter says a railroad company has been losing several hundred box cars per week through the eastern gateways, the responsibility of business going in at direction. The letter says that grain, lumber, canned goods, dried fruit, and many other heavy commodities are moving on minimums and are only partly loaded.

Tuesday, sustaining painful bruises about the back. Mr. Burns struck the ground on his back and suffered a severe internal jar as well as bruises. He was removed to his cabin on the camp grounds. Dr. E. E. Fisher of Salem was summoned and after making a thorough examination found no bones broken. Mr. Burns was reported as suffering much pain following the fall.

Frost Injures Corn.

The heavy frosts of Sunday, Monday and Tuesday nights did considerable damage to the corn throughout this section, farmers report. The corn was still green in the fields when the first frosts came, because of the late season. The corn, however, will make splendid ensilage if handled at once, or if it is cut and piled it may be preserved for making ensilage for about two weeks. If allowed to dry out much of its value is lost. County agriculturist Shrook of Yamhill county has issued a bulletin to farmers calling their attention to the advisability of putting the corn in the silo immediately.
