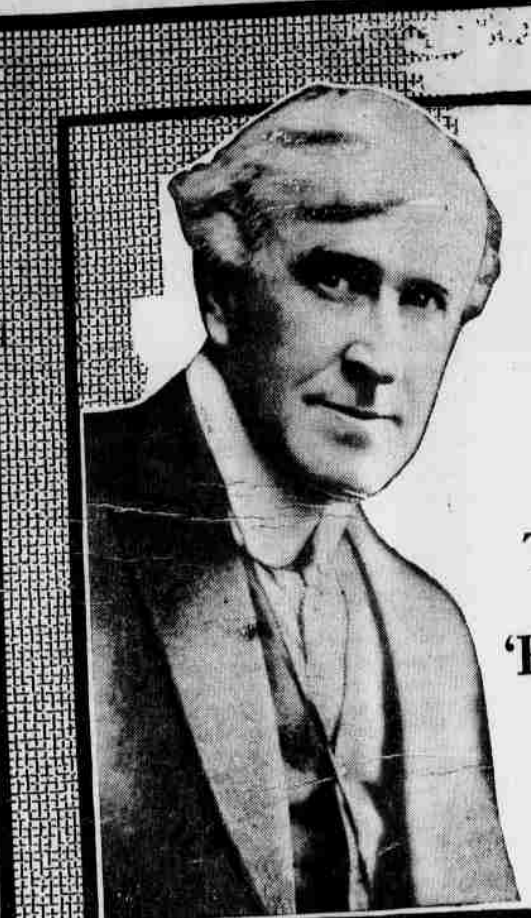

**Gives "American Boy" To Library.**

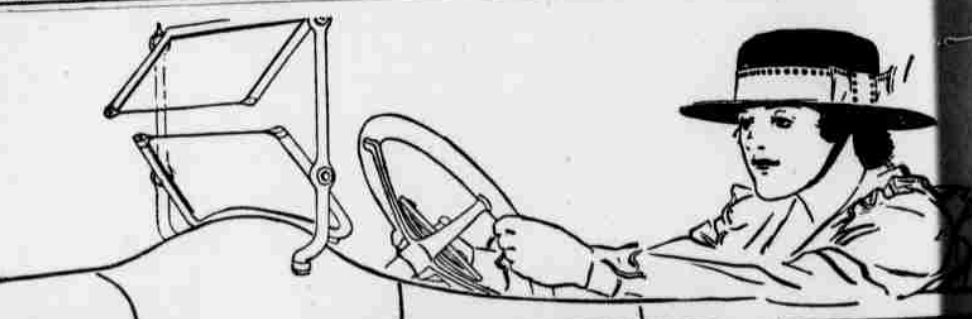
Miss Cora Rossiter has given year's subscription to the American Boy to the local library. The magazine is one of the popular periodicals of the day.

The Dallas Oratorio concert was to have been rendered Jan. 26 has been postponed until February 16. Sickness and unavoidable absences made this change necessary.



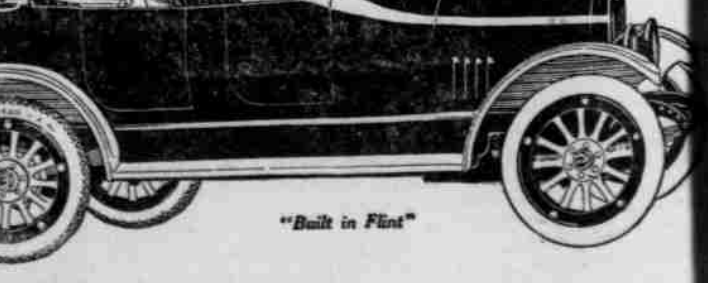
