T. T. Parker left for Portland Friday, where he will remain for a few days and receive treatments for eczema.

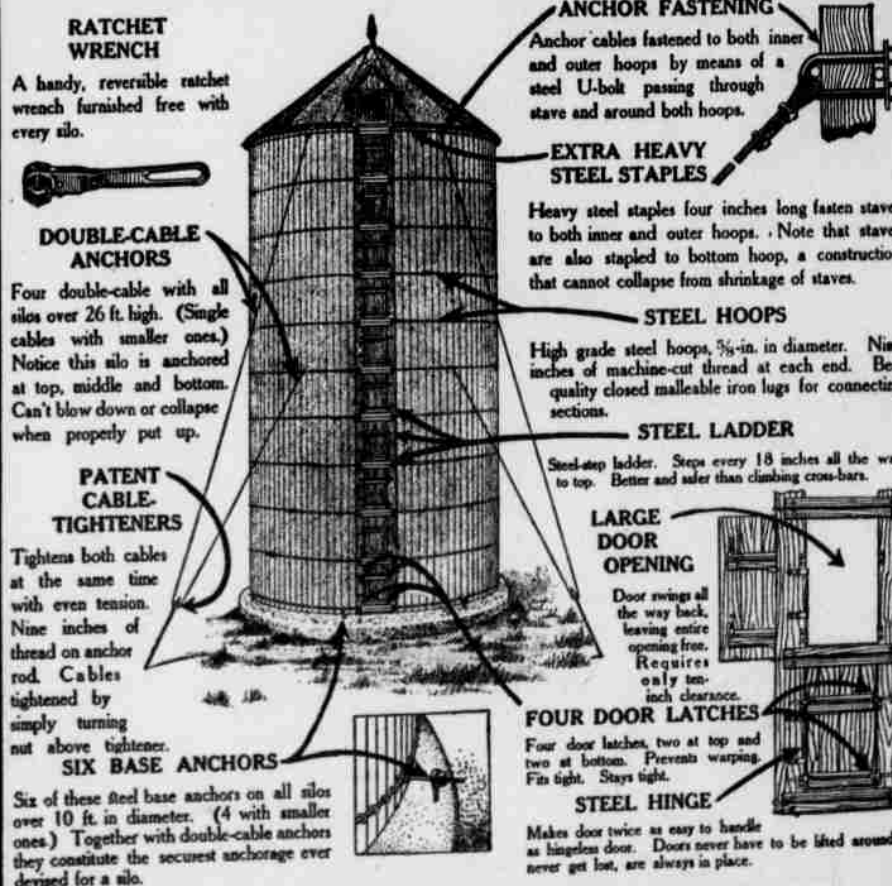
SHERIDAN ORDERED TO PAY.

Judge Belt Finds For City Engineer; Wages Were Held Up.

Engineer J. W. Morris has been sustained by Judge Belt in his suit to recover \$2796 for wages from the city of Sheridan.

The city set up two defenses in their case to prevent payment. They claimed that Morris had failed to do the work according to contract and that the city had already exceeded the charter indebtedness limit at the time the contract was drawn. The decision was for Morris, however. It was a Yamhill county case.
