MONMOUTH

The Normal school opened Monday for the second semester of the school year for 1916-17 with an enrollment of 507 which is 107 greater than the attendance last year.

Monmouth people are pleased to note that by arrangements made last week, the Normal will have ample training school privileges in the future. Last week contracts were entered into with the Independence school board for the use of the elementary departments of that city and a contract has also been made with the Mountain View school for the use of that school for rural training purposes. Mountain View is located on the railroad between Independence and Corvallis and at present has two rooms with fifty pupils. The Normal people will install one critic teacher. This school in addition to the Independence schools will make the number of pupils available for training purposes 500 and will remove the reason for complaint which the committee whose report was recently published, found with conditions at the Normal.

Twenty-four students from the Monmouth Normal will spend the third week of February in seven schools of Yamhill county. They will be distributed as follows: Four in Fernwood; four in Springbrook; four in Rex; four in Chehalam Center; four in Ewing Young school West Chehalam; two in Chehalam Valley, and two in Ribbon Ridge. M. S. Pittman of the normal wishes these young people to observe the actual work in the schools, to assist during the week as much as the teachers in charge sees fit, and to help in the arranging and giving a Washington's birthday exercises on the last day of their stay.

Miss Bessie Barnicott, who has been musical instructor at the Monmouth high school, graduated at the close of the last semester at the Normal and will leave for her home in Portland this week. Miss Mary Randall will take her place in the high school.
