BRIDGE BILL IS PASSED

\$6,000,000 ROAD BOND BILL ALSO IS PASSED.

Hawley's Bill Creating a State Lime Board and Carrying an Appropriation Finally Goes Through.

House Bill 375 finally passed the senate with minor amendments last night. This will put the supervision of the inter-county bridge in the hands of the highway commission.

At 12:40 this morning the senate passed a resolution proclaiming that both houses do adjourn at 12 o'clock midnight. The senate had appropriately stopped the clock at that hour, but the house was obliged to set the janitors at work, stop the clock and set it back to 11:45 before concurring in the resolution.

The entire session from 8 o'clock on was one of almost continual uproar and confusion, which Speaker Stanford tried in vain to keep down. Horseplay broke out continually. At 1:30 a batch of "josh" resolutions were taken to the desk, and the members insisted on having them read and passed.

In the meantime many important matters were finished up, including the concurrence of both houses in amendments to the \$6,000,000 road bond bill, which was passed by both houses as was a bill appropriating money for a special election on the bonds on June 4.

Senator Hawley's bill creating a state lime board and carrying an appropriation of \$20,000, passed the house and will become law with the governor's signature.

Hawley's bill, number 220, providing for the pasteurization of milk and cream also passed the senate last night. Three senate bills were indefinitely postponed; they are: S. 315 and 313.
