Stock Feeding Profitable.

It is being demonstrated more clearly than ever this winter that stock can be profitably fed in this country for the winter markets. I. M. Simpson, of Luckiamute, placed 54 head of thin lambs on feed the latter part of November, and they were sold on last Saturday to Boothby & Lewis for \$5 per hundred gross weight and are being shipped to the Portland market this week. The kind of feed used to fatten these lambs was Slough, or wild hay, whole oats and mangel-wurzel beets. Mr. Simpson says that much better results could have been obtained by the use of vetch hay, but he is satisfied with the experiment which has demonstrated to him that sheep can be fed profitably even with the present high price of feed. Tarter Brothers, of Airlie, are feeding some cattle which with the price now offered for them will make them good money for their trouble.
