Mr. Will Morrison, wife and little son, of Monmouth, came up the first of the week to visit relatives.

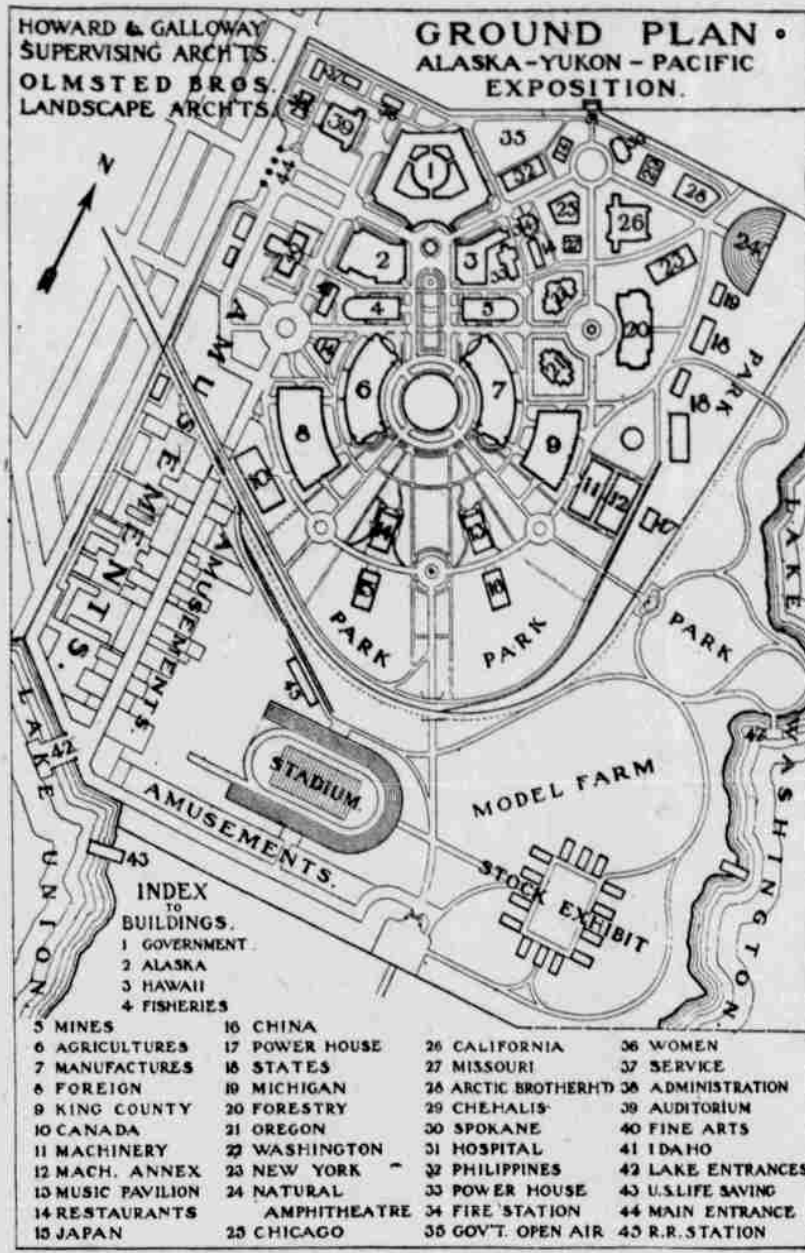
Mrs. Moses, of Corvallis, who has been visiting her daughter Mrs. Trask, returned home Wednesday.

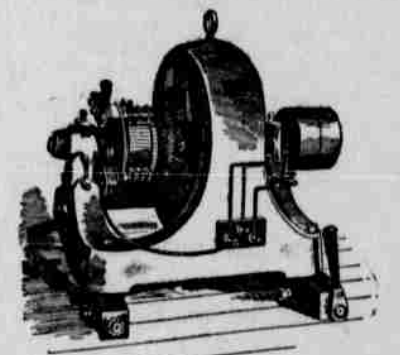
