Sunday, March 14th 1909.

Aeneas and Dorcas. Acts 9:31-43.

Golden Text—And Peter said unto him: Aeneas, Jesus Christ maketh thee whole, arise, and make thy bed. And he arose immediately. —Acts 9:34.

Verse 31.—Do darkness and light, fighting and victory, sorrow and joy, persecution and "rest" alternate and enter into every Christian life to-day, as in the Christian Community in the beginning?
