Controlling Apple Scab.

At a recent meeting of the Lane County Horticultural Society, Prof. Griffin, of the O. A. C. addressed the meeting on the subject of "Spraying." As reported in the Eugene Guard, Prof. Griffin said:

"Apple scab can be controlled by proper spraying with either Bordeaux mixture or lime-sulphur solutions. In humid regions probably at least three applications are necessary. The first just as the blossoms are beginning to show color, the second just after the petals fall, at the time of the first codling moth spray, and the third time some two or three weeks later.

"We have found it perfectly practicable to combine any good brand of arsenate of lead with pure lime-sulphur solutions made as above directed. The one application directly after the blossoms fall therefore becomes of value in controlling both apple scab and the codling moth.

"The results of two season's work indicate that properly prepared lime-sulphur solutions may advantageously be substituted for Bordeaux mixture when spraying for apple scab. It has produced each season a larger percentage of fruit free from scab and has not produced any 'russeting' of the fruit.

"Further experimental work is necessary to determine the proper strength of spray to use on different varieties of trees growing under different conditions, but it is believed that a 30 per cent stock solution diluted 1 to 18 may safely be used upon the apple."

Live Stock Exhibits at A. Y. P.

Seattle, Wash., Mar. 26;—

Down to date the principal middle west and east entries for the big livestock show which is to be a leading feature of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition this summer have come from the states of Nebraska, Illinois, Iowa, Indiana, Wisconsin, and Ohio.

In the far west, Idaho, Oregon and California have come strongly to the front and will show from all of the leading herds.

As originally planned the show was to have been little more than a western event but unprecedented demand from all over the country has compelled an enlargement of plans until it now promises to be the largest and most representative livestock show ever held in America.

Among the late Nebraska entries are Mousel Brothers, of Cambridge, showing Herefords; Straub Brothers, of Avoca, showing Galloways. Wisconsin's last entries were F. W. Harding, of Waukesha, showing beef breeds, and, in the horse division, McLay Brothers have been on the circuit during the season.

Among Iowa's entries are Otto V. Battles, of Maquoketa, showing Aberdeen Angus, and A. C. Binnie, of Alto, with the same breed. W. A. Van Atta of Fowler will show Herefords.

G. E. Clark, of St. Cloud, Minn., will show in the beef breeds and also Galloways especially.

The horse department will carry one of the largest and best displays of draught horses ever shown. Jay Crouch and Sons, of Lafayette, Indiana, and Alex Calbraith, of DeKalb, Illinois, are among late announcements.

The Percheron Registry Association of Columbus, Ohio has offered 17 gold and 17 silver medals and responses in the way of entries have been many. Robert Burgess and Sons, Winona, Illinois, Truman's Pioneer stud farm of Bushnell, Finch Brothers of Joilet, and the McLaughlins of Columbus, having been among late entries.

The stock show will cover an area 1,000 by 1,000 feet, the original plans having comprehended an area 700 by 300.

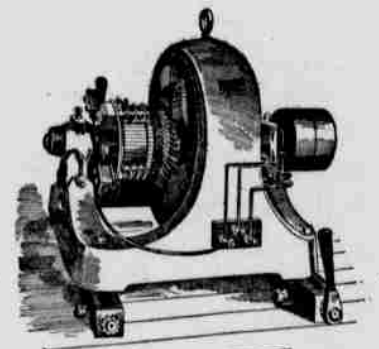
