Farmers Buy Fine Stallion.

Through the efforts of William Lancefield, of Amity, Hon. C. L. Hawley, I. J. White and G. E. McCrow, of McCoy, another fine breeding stallion has been purchased and brought into the Willamette Valley. They have organized the McCoy German Coach Association and purchased from A. C. Ruby, the great horse importer, a splendid German coach stallion, Brasig, valued at \$3000. He is a fine black 4-year-old, 17 hands high, weighs 1400 pounds, and is in every respect an almost perfect horse. The introduction of such animals into Polk county is doing much to bring up the standard of horseflesh in this section. — Dallas Observer.

THE ENTERTAINMENT COURSE

Committee Reports, Giving Detailed Account

TWO LECTURES AND FOUR CONCERTS

Receipts Exceed Expenditures, Leaving A Balance Of \$3.17

To the Citizens: Your committee on Entertainment Course take pleasure in submitting the report of the third year. Six of the entertainments were given, including two lectures and four concerts as follows: Prof. Gilbert Bancroft, psychologist, October, 30; Otto F. L. Herse, tenor, November 24; The Gamble Concert Party, Feb. 18; The Williams Dixie Jubilee Co., March 15; Dr. Thos. Green, Lecturer, March 22; Whitman College Glee Club, April 15.

Ninety-two season tickets were sold to children and students at \$1.50 each. Total receipts were \$207.50 from season ticket sales; \$168.35 from sales to different single entertainments and from balances from the DeMoss Concert and Prof. Leotsakos' lecture; \$4.57 balance from last year, or \$380.42 in all.

The expenditures amounted to \$377.35, leaving a balance of \$3.17 to start the next course. Bancroft and Herse each received \$25; Dr. Green, \$50; the Glee Club and the Gamble Co., each \$75; and the Dixie Co., \$103. \$4.25 was paid for printing and \$20 for use of Normal Chapel.

While the receipts were not so large this year as some other years, yet we were fortunate in securing reduced rates on two of the most expensive numbers. The regular charge for the Gamble Co. is \$125 and for Dr. Green \$100. The date for the former was an open one and secured by wire. The reduction on Dr. Green was due to the carelessness and procrastination of his manager and we profited thereby. As will be seen by the report, there was no money paid out for local service. The several dollars' expense for postage and clerical service in sending out letters and circulars was borne by the Normal. The Herald man deserves a note of thanks for the free advertising and write-ups for which he rendered no bill. There were no comps issued to any members of the committee, all of whom cheerfully paid for season ticket.

We would advise that preparations be commenced at once for next year's course, since entertainment bureaus are already in the field booking their attractions.
