Edd DeArmond and wife made a business trip to Albany last Monday.

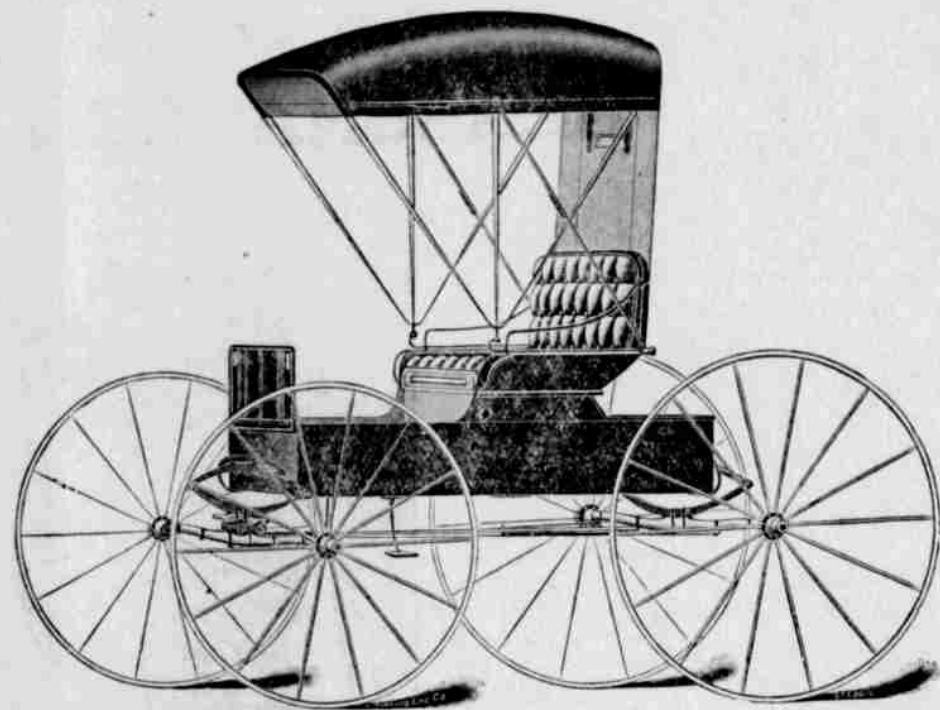

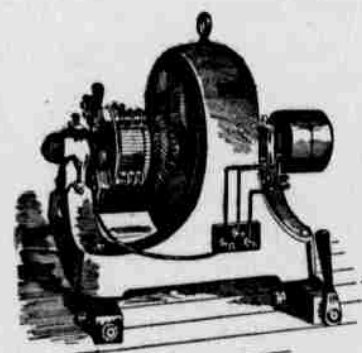
