The Independence public school base ball team lays claim to the championship of the county, as they defeated all comers. First they defeated Monmouth, then Dallas and later Falls City.

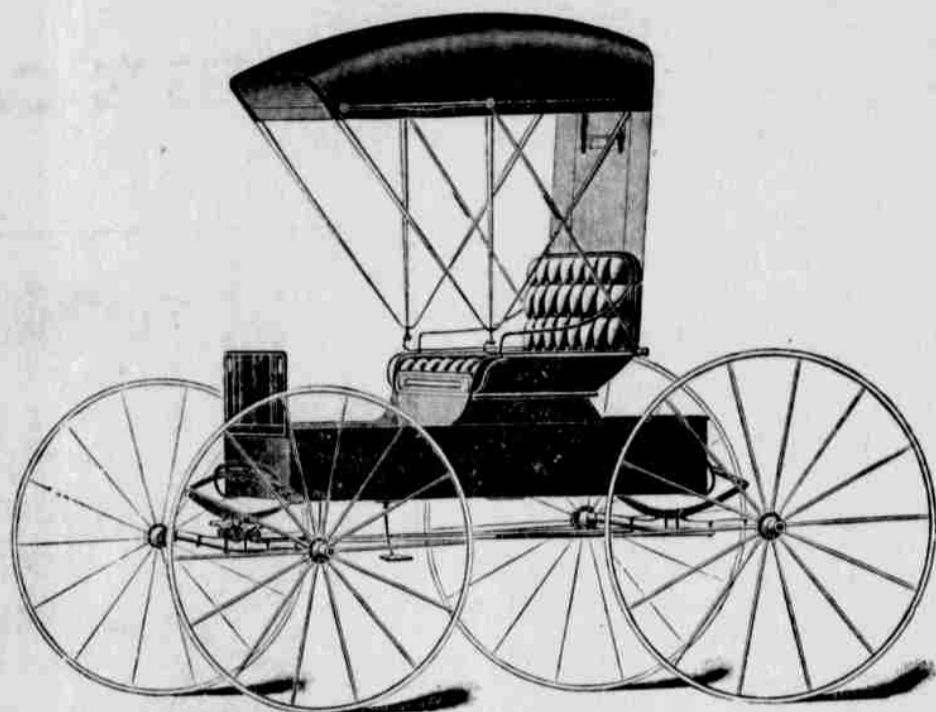
