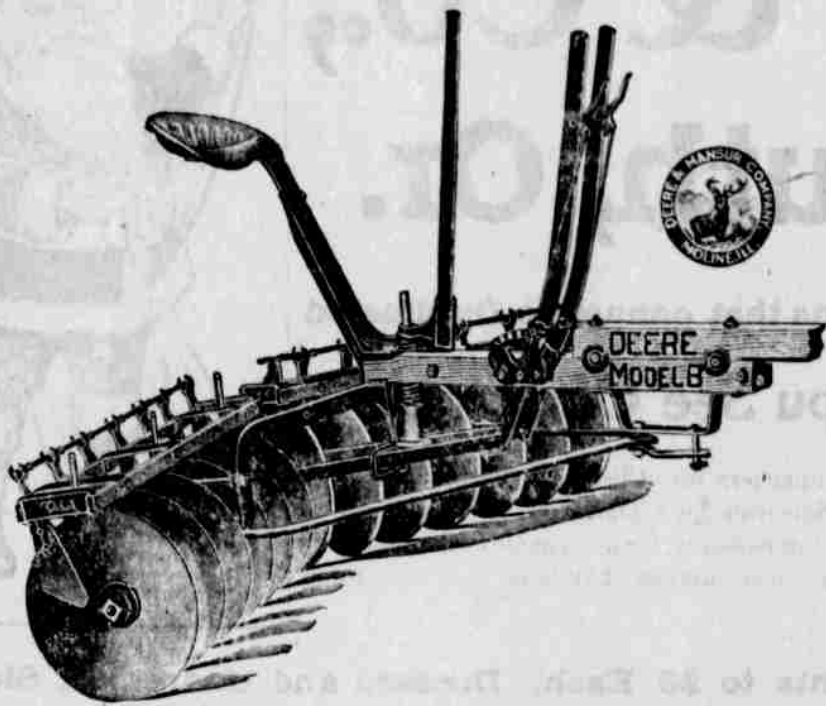


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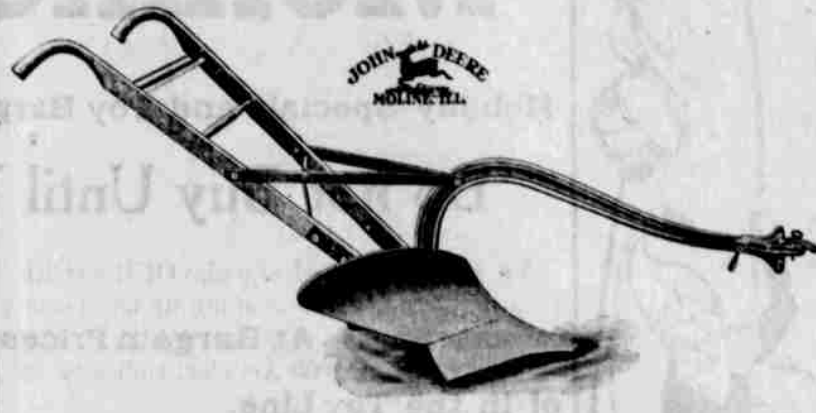

### Polk County High School Debating League

On Sat. Nov. 20, the different Principals of the several High Schools of the County and also of schools doing work above the eighth grade met in the office of the County School Sup't. at Dallas and completed plans and arrangements for the debating work for the county this year.

They are working along the same plans as last year, when the work of the High School Debating league was so successful. J. E. Dunton, principal of the Falls City High School, who was president of the league last year was reelected and Sup't. H. C. Seymour was reelected as Secretary of the league.

There will be twelve teams in the league this year and the triangular system of debating will be followed, the first debate will be held the first of Jan., the second on the first of Feb., and

the third the first of March.

A cup has been offered to the team winning the championship for the county and if won two years in succession by the same team, to be the property of the school, also gold, silver, and bronze medals will be given the successful debaters.

Much interest has been shown in the work by the different members of the different schools and everything points to a successful year's work in the league this year.

The program of the different debates and also the question for debate and the arrangement of the different teams will be published later.
