A Probable New Industry for This Vicinity

For some weeks options have been quietly secured on lands in the Oakdale vicinity, one of the properties purchased being the old rock quarry. This is the industry we spoke of some weeks ago, and to some extent, is as yet a surmise, as the parties taking options are very reticent about their doings. That our rock, such as was used in the court house, is of fine quality for such a commodity is well known to all who have studied its constituents. It has sufficiently been tried to insure its worth for practical purposes, and fully demonstrated its fitness for such a purpose, and it is probably the only rock in Oregon that would make first class cement. — Polk County Itemizer.
