WESTON'S NORMAL SCHOOL

Local Sentiment a Unit For Making a Campaign

The normal school mass meeting Wednesday evening, was largely attended. Willingness to make another effort in behalf of the Weston Normal was indicated by a unanimous rising vote. No plan of campaign was formulated however, this duty being left to an executive committee to be selected later.

Mayor O. C. Turner was elected chairman of the meeting, and T. S. McKinney secretary. Brief addresses were made by Clark Wood, Dan C. Kirk, J. E. Keefe, jr., and S. A. Barnes, and a letter was read from P. A. Worthington. Upon motion of Mr. Barnes the chair appointed a booster committee as follows:

The mass meeting was marked by earnestness and enthusiasm, and it is evident that it is the community's concerted desire to make one more effort in behalf of the Eastern Oregon State Normal School, and to settle its fate for all time by an appeal to the people of Oregon. One of the speakers paid warm tribute to Mr. Worthington as among the oldest and strongest friends of the school, after reading a letter in which he pledged again his loyal support.

The booster committee will meet next Monday afternoon at three o'clock in the afternoon. — Weston Leader.
