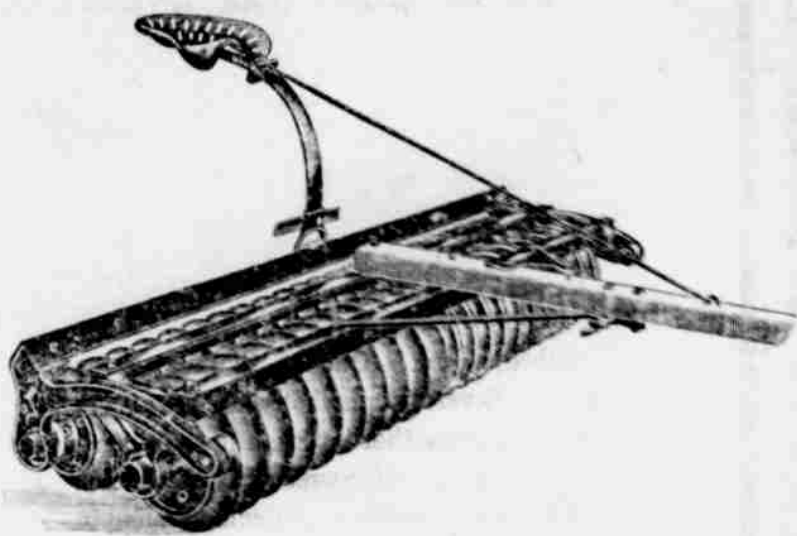


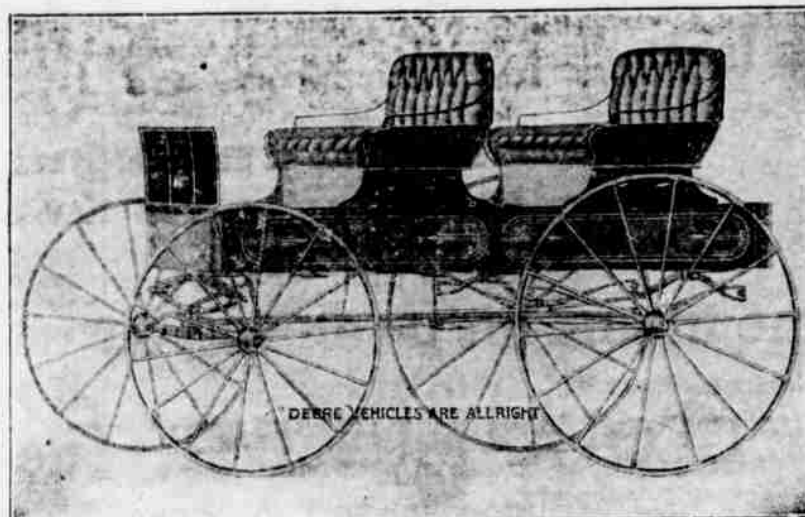

New Sawmill Near Falls City

What will be one of the best equipped and most modern sawmills on the coast is being erected about two miles south of Falls City near the home of County Commissioner J. B. Teal by his son, Albert, who went to Portland Monday to purchase the boiler and engine for the new mill. The capacity of the plant will be fifteen thousand feet per day and the entire product will be ties, bridge timbers and other heavy dimension stuff has been contracted for by the Falls City Lumber Company for a period of two years. The mill is surrounded by a body of fine timber which it will take years' of constant operation to cut.

Few, if any, men in Oregon, are as well qualified to erect and operate a sawmill as is Albert Teal. For nineteen years he has been engaged in the mill and timber business and it goes without saying that this important addition to the industries of Falls City will continually employ a large number of men and will be operated profitably for the owner. — Falls City News.
