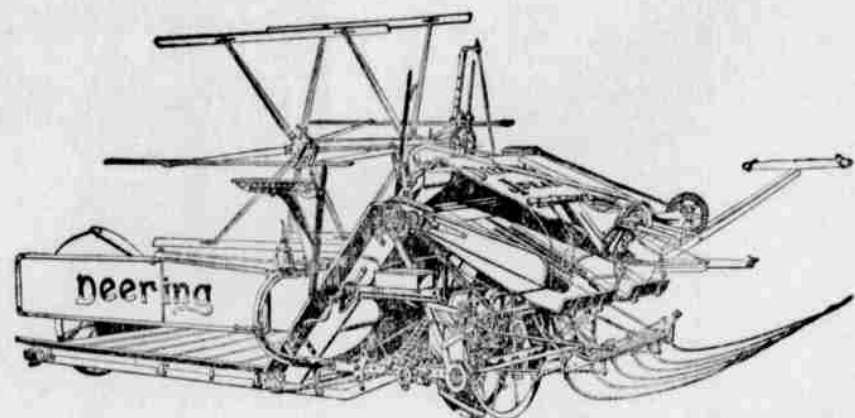


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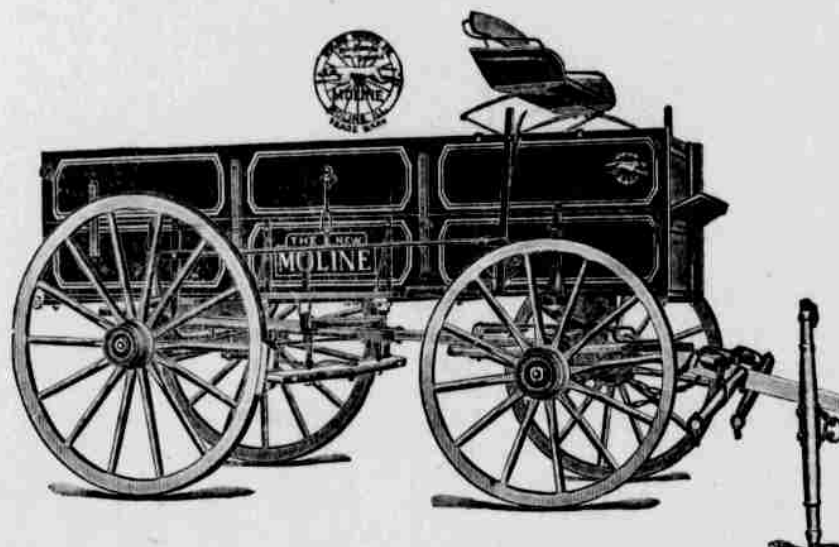
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Local and Personal

IN MEMORIAM

Mrs. Fishback Passes Away on Monmouth Heights

The death of Mrs. Elizabeth Fishback occurred Thursday afternoon, July 7th, 1910, at 2:15, P. M., at the age of 55 years and 1 month.

The deceased was born in Wayne County, Iowa, June 7, 1855. The funeral services were held at her home Friday afternoon, July 8, 1910, Elder E. C. Wigmore of Eugene officiated, and the remains were laid to rest in the K. of P. Cemetery South of Monmouth beside those of her husband and daughter who preceded her to the other world.

Mrs. Fishback, whose maiden name was Scott, crossed the plains with her parents in 1865, first locating in Yamhill county, Oregon.

She united with the Christian Church at Rickreall, Polk County Oregon, in 1867, under the preaching of Elder MacWaller.

Miss Elizabeth Scott was married to John L. Fishback at Hope-well, Yamhill County, Oregon, April 5, 1874.

To this happy union were born 10 children, 7 sons and 3 daughters, 9 of whom are living.

She lived a devoted christian, a faithful wife and a true and loving mother until death.

Besides her children, she left to mourn their loss, one sister, Mrs. Martha Addison of Newberg, Oregon, and two brothers, Clemens G. Scott of Carlton, Oregon, and Harmon Scott of Pullman, Washington, and a host of other relatives and friends.

An Eye Opener

Wouldn't the easterner open his eyes in wonder at a box of loganberries brought to this office this morning! Many of them are two inches in length and few are less than one and a half inches. If you don't think a two inch berry is "going some," just measure some of the ordinary berries and find out. These berries were raised by Mrs. John Rickard, on unirrigated ground in her garden in this city, and she has almost a ton on a few bushes. This is a wonderfully beautiful fruit, somewhat tart unless thoroughly ripened, but as grown in the Willamette valley would grace any multimillionaire's table if he could get them. The loganberry is the most prolific bearer of all the small fruits. —Gazette Times, Corvallis.

Sees Wonderful Possibilities

R. H. Campbell brought in a sample of his Royal Ann cherries from his Hill Crest orchard in the Highland district. These cherries graded among the highest in the Salem market this summer. He took 700 pounds to Salem for which he received four cents per pound. These cherries graded from sixty to seventy-five and are a fair sample of the Rogue river cherries which sell regularly at nine to ten cents per pound. Mr. Campbell sees no reason why cherries from the Willamette valley, which he says are as fine as any he has seen in the Rogue river valley from where he came to this valley, should not have a value equal to those of that country. Mr. Campbell is demonstrating that Polk county can raise as good quality fruit as grown anywhere. The Summit orchard which adjoins Mr. Campbell, grew 100 per cent wormy

fruit last year. After spraying five times under his direction it will yield a 90 per cent pack. Independence can well feel proud of the work which Mr. Campbell has done during his short residence in Polk county. —Enterprise.

Serious Accident

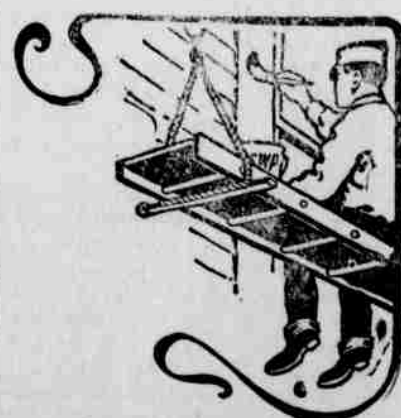
