Portland Fair to have Tuberculin test for Cattle

OREGON HOP ESTIMATED 90,000 BALES

Washington Dairyman Cleared \$13 a Month Each from Nine Cows

Portland, Or., Aug. 16.—Portland's Harvest Festival, September 5-10, will have no end of amusement features and quantities of blooded livestock on view, together with stirring races by the best trotting, pacing and running stock to be had, but perhaps the most interesting feature on the grounds to many who will attend will be the demonstration of tuberculin tests for dairy cows to be given by Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinary. Animals with tuberculosis will be given the tests and their value explained in a lecture. The animals will be slaughtered and the evidence of tubercular conditions shown and discussed. This is expected to be a great attraction for large numbers of dairymen and others interested.

Estimates of Oregon's hop crop for the year place the figure at 90,000 bales. The quality of the yield is reported to be excellent and it is expected a good price will be paid for the crop if picked clean. Special efforts to secure clean picking will be made by growers.

That field peas should be grown on the big acreage of Summer fallow in Eastern Oregon each year is the opinion of experts. There is profit in the practice, while the fertility of the soil is increased and weeds kept down. H. Grebe, a wheat grower of Condon, finds he makes more off his peas, acre for acre, than from his wheat and wheat sown on the same land the following year produces one-third more than land merely Summer fallowed and allowed to lie idle. Hogs grow fat on the peas, adding enormously to the wealth of the grain growing sections of the Northwest.

President Stevens, of the Oregon Trunk Line, the Hill road up the Deschutes, announces that his company will build south to a connection with the Pacific & Eastern, reaching out from Medford. This will give the Hill system a main trunk line down through Central Oregon, from which will spring lateral branches into nearby productive territory.

A splendid advertisement of the advantages of the Pacific Northwest is the decision of Jasper Wilson, son of James Wilson, Secretary of Agriculture, to engage in fruit growing in the Pacific Northwest. He will develop only 20 acres at present, considering this ample to keep him fully occupied. That a man who has all the professions open to him should choose horticulture in the Northwest as the best opportunity is highly significant and is a splendid endorsement of this section of the country.

Eight big ocean steamers and

one sailing vessel were in the Willamette River on August 9, loading Oregon products for various ports across the sea, in addition to the usual number of coasting vessels, one of the most formidable fleets to assemble in a Pacific Northwest port for months. The combined cargoes amount to 23,000,000 feet of Oregon fir, together with miscellaneous freight, and destinations include Hong Kong, New Zealand, Manilla, Shanghai, Australia and other Oriental ports.

A dairy farmer of Washington County makes the statement he has cleared \$13 net on each of his nine cows every month, making a snug income from that source alone of \$1046 in the past nine months. This is an industry that is capable of almost illimitable expansion in this state.

Many Going to Circus

Monmouth will be well Represented in Salem on Aug. 27.

The Barnum and Baily Greatest Show on Earth is the powerful magnet that will draw a great many people from Monmouth and vicinity on August 27, 1910 to Salem. The railroads will make a special low rate and excursions will be run.

A glance at the list of features offered by this circus discloses many wonders. Jupiter, "the Balloon Horse," takes a trip to the dome of the tent and comes back to earth amid a shower of fireworks. Desperado, a rash Frenchman, dives from the top of the arena to the ground, lighting on his bare chest. Charlie the First, a chimpanzee, presents a greater bicycle and acrobatic act than any man ever achieved. A company of fifty clowns creates incessant laughter. A member of the Siegrist-Silbon family of aerialists, blindfolds his eyes and leaps across the entire width of the arena, turns a double somersault on the way and catches the wrists of a comrade who hangs head down from a flying swing. The Abreu family of Mexican gymnasts introduce a great novelty act. Berzac's horses present an amusing play, the scene of which is laid in a country inn. One horse plays landlord and another is the town constable. The other horses make very amusing boarders. Paula Peters' monkey and dog circus holds the attention of the audience for half an hour. A mastiff villain sets fire to the hero's cottage. The dog fire department responds. The captain climbs a ladder and rescues Miss Poodle and an ape detective puts the villain in a cell. Other notables are the Koynot family of riders, the La Faille family of world's strongest men, Winston's equestrian seals, the Dollar family of acrobats, and Victoria Codona, the greatest high wire artist in the world.

In the menagerie are to be found 1,200 rare wild animals. Among them is Bumbeeno, the only giraffe ever born or exhibited in America. It is but three feet high and is worth its weight in gold. There are 40 elephants, 700 horses and 1,280 employees. The show travels on a train over a mile in length. The forenoon parade is the most gorgeous affair ever offered by a circus. It cost \$1,000,000.
