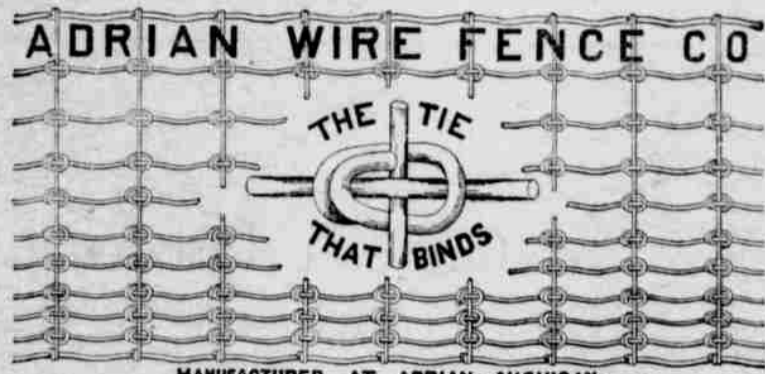


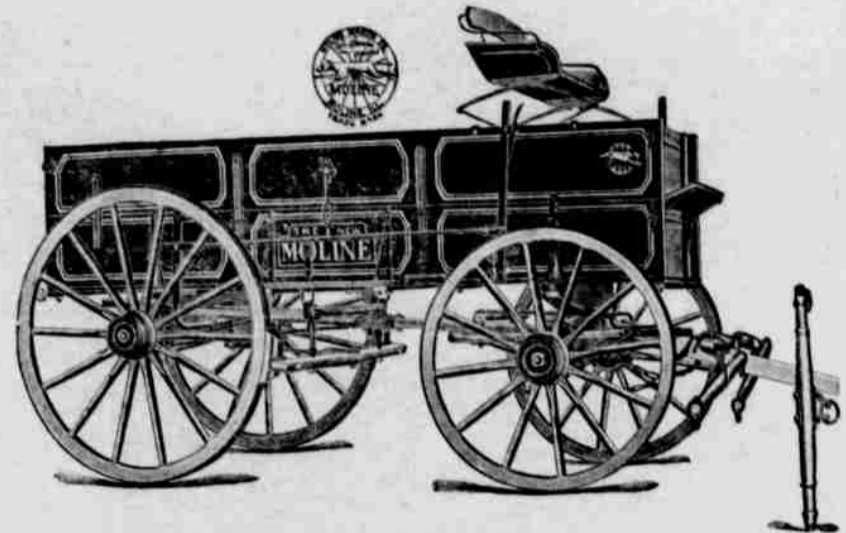

Kill Doe With Horns

Dr. S. C. Endicott and his brother, Dr. Chas. Endicott, of Coquille returned last Friday from upper Rock creek, where they had been enjoying a hunting and fishing outing. They had much success, both with fish and game, and enjoyed the time very much. Dr. Endicott reports having killed a freak deer—a doe with horns. The horns of the animal were of good length, on one side straight and the other side forked. The freak is not an unknown one, the horns usually being small, insignificant affairs, but it is believed that no female deer with as fully a developed set of horns has ever before been killed in this section. The head was sent to Marshfield where it is being mounted, and will become a valuable part of Dr. Endicott's collection.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.
