St Louis Editor Favors Holding Exposition In San Francisco

New Orleans is lustily proclaiming its endorsement by St. Louis as the logical site for the Panama-Pacific Exposition. That this crowing is rather premature and that the "endorsement" is not all that could be desired is indicated by the following editorial in the St. Louis Times frankly advocating the claims of San Francisco:

"Despite the fact that a partial promise has been made in St. Louis which would seek to anchor this city to the position of favoring New Orleans as the place for holding the Panama Exposition, there is a distinct tone of another kind to be heard on every side.

"The question is being asked, why should New Orleans be favored in this relationship, at the expense of San Francisco, which is making a vigorous effort to obtain the exposition?

"The St. Louis Times is free to say that it can think of no good reason why this city should favor New Orleans as against San Francisco.

"The argument of 'neighborliness' is, perhaps, more than counterbalanced by other arguments which readily come to mind.

"Summer has always been the accepted season for World's Fairs; therefore, the matter of climate should be a first consideration. New Orleans has a very kindly climate to offer winter tourists, but its summers are unbearable. General Humidity appears to have his fortifications established most strongly in the beautiful Crescent City, and he is the known foe to comfort and exercise of every kind.

"On the other hand, San Francisco's climate in the summer season may almost be said to err in the other direction. It is cool, if not quite chilly; and it is the bracing quality in the air which acts as a stimulant to all pleasure seeking.

"Again, San Francisco is on the salt water, while New Orleans has to summon her fleets from a point more than half a hundred miles away.

"As to the benefits of the Panama Exposition, certainly there is no city which will reap so great a number as San Francisco. By the turning loose of the tides in the great canal, it will be suddenly incorporated as an American city in a new respect. It has been out of the American world all these years, and has built up a musical, literary and financial sphere of its own. With the completion of the canal, San Francisco's address will suddenly become, 'U. S. A.'—a sufficient reason why it should wish to celebrate on mighty scale."

Notice of Meeting of Board of Equalization

Notice is hereby given that on Monday, the 17th day of October 1910, the Board of Equalization will meet at the County Court-house at the city of Dallas, in the county of Polk, state of Oregon, to examine and correct all assessment rolls, to correct all errors in valuations, descriptions or qualities of land, lots, or other property, or incorrectly assessed as to description or quality; or where assessed in the name of a person or persons not the owner thereof or assessed under or beyond the actual cash value thereof and to assess all lands, lots and other property appearing to have been omitted or that was not as-

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essed.
Petitions or applications for the reduction of a particular assessment shall be made in writing, verified by the oath of the applicant or his attorney and be filed with the board during the first week it is by law required to be in session, and any petition or application not so made, verified and filed shall not be considered or acted upon by the board.
