Town Council Meeting

Pursuant to adjournment the Town Board of Trustees met Monday evening, at the town hall, Mayor Hawley, Councilmen A. B. Morlan, P. O. Powell and J. L. Murdock, Recorder L. Grounds and Marshal S. D. Coates being present, added to whom were some twelve or fourteen citizens of the town.

Mayor Hawley called the house to order, after which the minutes of the last regular meeting were read and accepted, also the minutes of the adjourned meeting were read.

The regular order of business was taken up and accounts audited as follows:

Mayor Hawley then reported as a committee, having been appointed to interview Mr. Kauffman, of Independence, about moving a portion of a building which stands on a lot which the town disposed of. Report was that the company will pay \$45 for the property but will not move the building, having had undisputed possession for a number of years.

The drain proposition which came up in October as to extending the tiling near E. C. Ecker's lot was continued in hands of the street committee.

The committee on streets and crossings, was also instructed to look after the needs of the town as regards to more light, a petition having been presented for another light in the East end of town, near W. H. Robertson's corner.

Civic improvement was taken up and sidewalks, sewerage and water systems each received attention but no definite action was taken.

The meeting then adjourned.
