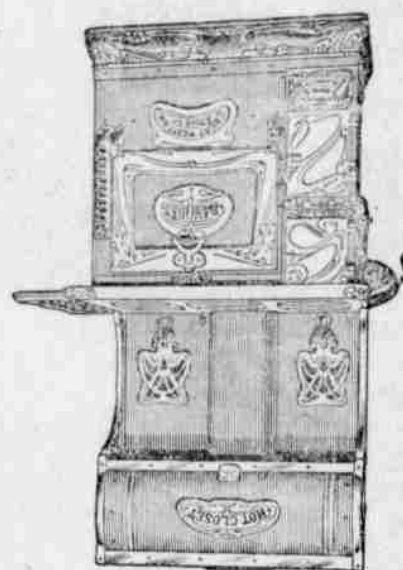

Nominated Town Ticket

Pursuant to a call posted, some twenty-odd citizens of Monmouth assembled at the town hall, Monday evening to place in nomination a ticket to be voted on at the coming town election.

The house was called to order by Charles Doughty, acting as temporary chairman, upon which R. M. Smith was called to the chair by the action of the house and D. E. Stitt to the secretaryship.

The object of the meeting being stated and the offices to be filled at the coming election named the house proceeded to make nominations.

For mayor John Remington, Otis A. Wolverton and J. L. Murdock were nominated and balloting began.

Four ballots were necessary to a decision, John Remington receiving the nomination.

For councilmen—one year term: J. L. Murdock, J. W. White and Charles Herren were put in nomination, resulting in the choice of J. L. Murdock.

For the two year term two councilmen were needed and the nominees were J. W. White and T. F. Kelsay and Chas. Herren, the result being the choice of Messrs. Herren and White.

J. E. Winegar was nominated for treasurer, D. E. Stitt for recorder, and for marshal, C. A. Nott, S. D. Coates and L. M. Hall were named with the choice falling on C. A. Nott.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned.
