## Spelling Contest

Result of the Spelling Contest for schools of two or more rooms, held on Dec. 16th, 1910.

Fourth Grade—First place: Dallas 99 5-9 per cent; Second place: Bethel 98 2-8 per cent; Third place: Monmouth, Buena Vista (tie) 97 per cent.

Fifth Grade—First place: Bethel 99 per cent; Second place: Rickreall, Falls City (tie) 97 per cent; Third place: Dallas 96 per cent.

Sixth Grade—First place: Bethel 100 per cent; Second place: Falls City 98 per cent; Third place: Monmouth, Boell (tie) 94 per cent.

Seventh grade—First place: Falls City 97 per cent; Second place: Bethel 96 per cent; Third place: Dallas 92 per cent.

Eighth Grade—First place: Independence 96 per cent; Second place: Bethel, Mountain View (tie) 95 per cent; Third place: Monmouth, Rickreall, Falls City (tie) 94 per cent.

All schools of two or more rooms in the county, that were in session, took part in the contest.

The committee on the spelling has decided to give a certificate to every grade in the county making an average of 95 per cent and as there are three contests, each grade winning two or more of the small certificates will be given a large certificate, which will contain the names of all pupils in the class.

The following schools win certificates for the contest on Dec. 16th: Fourth Grade—Dallas, Monmouth, Airie, Bethel, Buena Vista, Falls City, Black Rock; Fifth Grade—Dallas, Bethel, Rickreall, Falls City, Black Rock; Sixth Grade—Bethel, Falls City; Seventh Grade—Bethel, Falls City; Eighth Grade—Bethel, Independence, Mountain View.

The next contest will be held Feb. 24th and it is hoped that all schools will take part.

### RURAL DISTRICTS

Result of spelling contest for rural schools, held Dec., 16, 1910.

Fourth Grade—First place, Etna 100 per cent; Second place, Oak Point, Elkins, McCoy, Mistletoe 97 per cent; Third place, Cochran, Enterprise 92 per cent.

Fifth Grade—Gooseneck, Etna, Sunnyslope 100 per cent; Second place: McCoy, Cherry Grove 98 per cent; Third place, Spring Valley 97 per cent.

Sixth Grade—First place: Mistletoe 100 per cent; Second place, Enterprise 99 1-5 per cent; Third place, Eola, Oak Point 98 per cent.

Seventh Grade—First place, Enterprise, Etna, McCoy 100 per cent; Second place, Cherry Grove 99 per cent; Third place, No 15, Spring Valley, Upper Salt Creek, Oak Hurst 98 per cent.

Eighth Grade—First place, Pedee, Oak Point, Harmony, Mistletoe 98 per cent; Second place, Butler 97 per cent; Third place, Oakhurst, Highland 96 per cent.

The committee on spelling for rural schools has decided to give a small certificate to each class making 95 per cent or more any test, and as there are six tests any class winning four or more certificates will be given a large certificate which will contain the names of the pupils of the class.

The following have won certificates for the last test: Fourth Grade—Oak Point, Elkins, Etna, McCoy, Mistletoe; Fifth Grade—Polk Station, Gooseneck, Spring Valley, Etna, Sunnyslope, Lone Star, McCoy, Cherry Grove;

Sixth Grade—Eola, Parkers, Oak Point, Upper Salt Creek, Enterprise, Oakhurst, Mistletoe; Seventh Grade—Eola, Parkers, No. 15, Polk Station, Spring Valley, Upper Salt Creek, Enterprise, Etna, McCoy, Cherry Grove, Oakhurst; Eighth Grade—Pedee, Butler, Oak Point, Harmony, Upper Salt Creek, Oakhurst, Highland, Mistletoe.

The next test will take place Jan. 20th and it is hoped that every class in the county will take part. All but five schools took part in the last contest and we want all in the next.
