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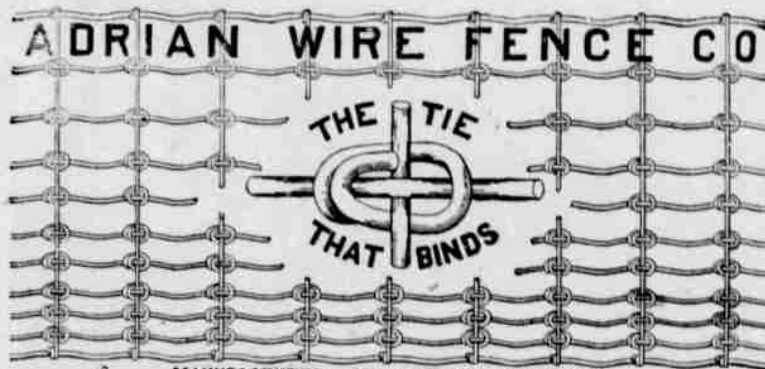

Saves Farmers Thousands of Dollars

Agricultural College teaches how to save money by using right methods.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore., March 2—An actual saving of over \$1000 in horse feed resulted from the information gained by a prominent business man and farmer of Salem, in the winter short course at the Oregon Agricultural College. Last year he came himself to the course, and this year, be- unnable to attend, he sent his ranch foreman. The knowledge gained in the course on feeding of horses alone netted him a saving of over \$1000 in his feed bills and his animals are in finer condition than ever before he says.

Over \$5000 would have been saved by S. W. Jamieson of Dell, he estimates, if he had taken the short course two years ago. In- experience and lack of training when he came west two years ago to develop his holdings of 4000 acres of fruit lands, caused Mr. Jamieson to make the usual mistakes of the beginner. Upon attending the course at the college this winter he discovered his mistake, and made a careful computation of his consequent losses which amounted to over \$5000.

These are but two of a large number of similar cases which have come to the attention of Dean Arthur B. Cordley of the college. It is a special aim of the college not only to equip young men to go out after graduation and develop the new lands to their utmost capacity, but to help the farmers, stockmen and orchardmen of the state who are already caring for lands of their own or in charge of large estates to get the greatest possible value out of the land, and to help them

to solve the problems that arise and to get rid of the pests which injure crops.
