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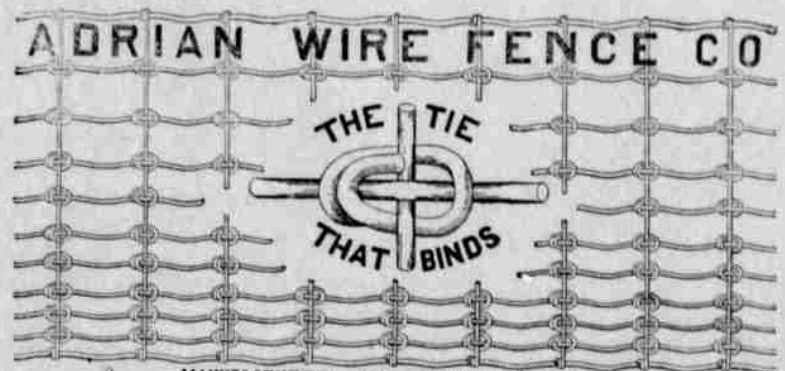

City Council Proceedings

The City board met in the Town Hall, Tuesday evening, in adjourned term and proceedings as hereafter given were enacted there being a full board present. Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

A discussion of the procedure necessary to secure a water system having proceed, a motion was made and sustained to employ Attorney B. F. Swope to draw up a supplementary act to the city charter making the necessary provision.

An ordinance for the construction of cement sidewalks having been drawn up was next taken under consideration, read and discussed and read the second time and passed on to its third reading.

The ordinance provides for five feet sidewalks on all the streets running North and South between Clay and Jackson streets as far East as East street with a curbing ten feet from property line. The same provision is made for Jackson, Clay and Main Streets except that on Main from Monmouth Avenue to Broad Street the sidewalk is to be eight feet with the curbing on the outer edge, and on Monmouth Avenue from the Northeast corner of the Normal school grounds to Clay Street the sidewalk is to be eight feet, and on the balance of Monmouth Avenue it will conform to that of other streets.

The ordinance provides that as fast as present sidewalks need rebuilding that the new ordinance will take effect.

The meeting then adjourned to meet at 6:30 o'clock Tuesday evening, March 28.

Fire Threatened Capitol.

Salem, March 18. — Destruction of the statehouse by fire was only averted this afternoon by the prompt action of Gardner E. Wallace, who, upon being attracted by the column of smoke issuing from the dome of the capitol about 4 o'clock, rushed to the top of the building and found that a pile of rubbish had ignited, presumably from a lighted cigar end that had been cast away by a careless sightseer.

As a result of the incident Chief Clerk H. H. Corey, of the Secretary of State's office, who is custodian of the capitol, has made an order that no more sightseers will be given the privilege of visiting the dome without a special permit. So dry is the woodwork in the dome of the capitol that had the fire gained any headway before being detected, or had smouldered without giving any alarm until all attaches had left the building at 5 o'clock, there would have been great difficulty in saving the building.
