## SHALL WE BOND?

Now the bonding of the school district is coming up for the consideration of Monmouth taxpayers and each voter should give the subject thoughtful, intelligent attention, as it is a measure that will have an influence upon our school district and town in the future.

There are some things that help to build up a town and persons desiring to locate in a city usually inquire about these things and persons not interested in part of them, at least, are not generally considered as very desirable acquisitions to a vicinity, and chief among these things are schools, churches and highways. Among the questions usually asked when enquiring after a location are these: What are your school privileges? What are the church conditions? What road advantages have you to offer?

Some may think that these things count but little when a man desires to locate, but it is not so. The writer knew of an instance where no church privileges killed a sale of land where all other conditions were satisfactory and where the purchaser, himself, cared little or nothing for church privileges.

The instance was thus: The party had looked the place over and was satisfied with the soil and location; then he enquired as to the price and that was also satisfactory; the next inquiry was school privileges and as the school house stood on one corner of the land, there was no objection to schools; "Now," said the person desiring to purchase, "What are your church privileges?" the agent shook his head and replied that there were none whatever, as there was no church organization anywhere within reach of that locality.

The prospective purchaser quit right there, remarking that he did not himself care for church matters, but said: "My wife likes to take active part in church and church affairs and I would not deprive her of that pleasure for anything." The sale was not completed.

Now there is only one thing that we can give to the rising youths that men cannot take from them. If we leave them lands they may be swindled out of them or induced to part with them and spend the proceeds; if we leave them a bank account thieves may break in and steal or something else turn up to take away the gift, but if we give them a good education and teach them to be self-supporting and independent, then we have given them something that is valuable and which they can retain, and not only that, but they will carry their intelligence with them when they pass into the after-life.

Monmouth needs a school

building and we should be equal to the occasion and see that it is secured to the district. Of course it will cost something, but nothing desirable is secured without sacrifice. It requires thought and energy to secure desirable objects, so let us strive to secure a school building.

War and rumors of war! More rumor than war, but sufficient of the latter to make it critical for the Mexican government and the resignation of President Diaz' cabinet indicates the serious straight the administration is in. There are two dissatisfied bodies in Mexico, one that is up and in arms and one that is dissatisfied with conditions, but is not taking definite stand, and perhaps the fate of Diaz' government rests with this class.

A secret alliance between Japan and Mexico is said to have been the cause for mobilization of United States troops on the Mexican frontier. The treaty is said to have been abrogated because of the notice given by the display of troops, and that withdrawal will take place as fast as expedient without disclosing haste. Congress will soon convene in extra session and then the facts will probably be made public.

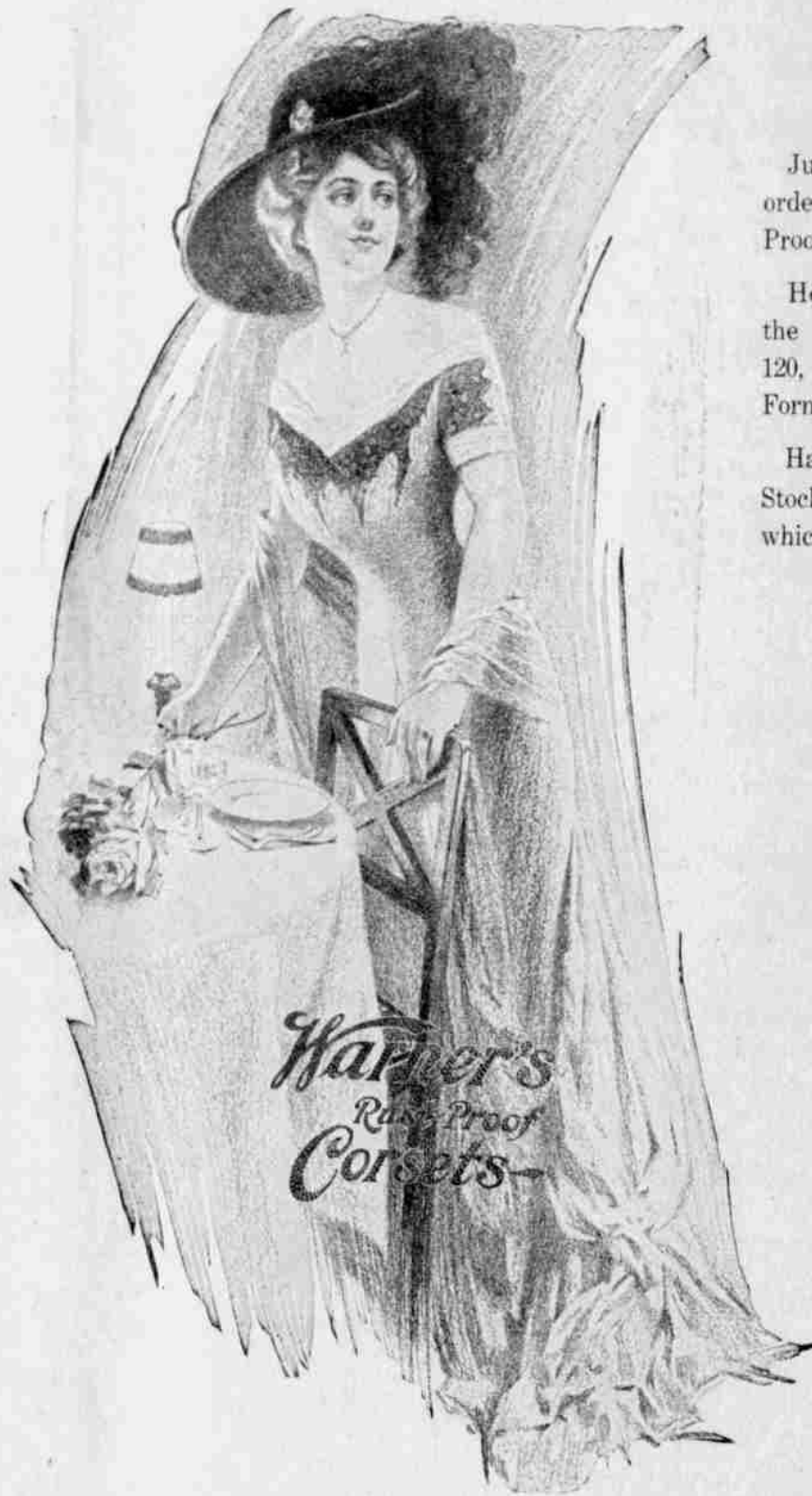
