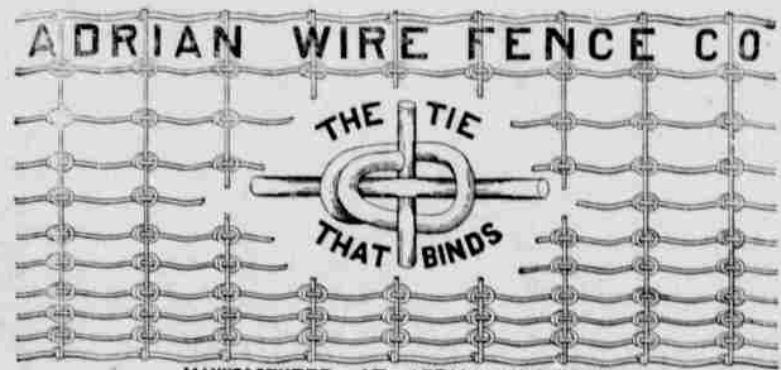

City Council Met.

Last week the meeting of the town council was crowded out and we give the proceedings of the two meetings below:

On March 28 the council finished reading an ordinance authorizing concrete sidewalks and adopted the same, and took up an ordinance authorizing an amendment to the city charter to the extent that the city can bond in a sum not to exceed \$25000, for the purpose of securing a sufficient water supply for the city, which supplementary act to the charter was read twice and laid over till the next meeting.

The street committee was empowered to hire a surveyor and establish grades for the streets and sidewalks.

At the council meeting Tuesday night, April 4, the supplementary act to amend the city charter was read the third time, passed by the council and received the signature of Mayor Remington.

Street committee reported that two surveyors had been written to and heard from; that either would be pleased to do the surveying but that neither had set a price. The committee was instructed to get further information before employing a surveyor.

The council meeting then adjourned to meet Tuesday evening, April 11, at 8 o'clock, in regular session.
