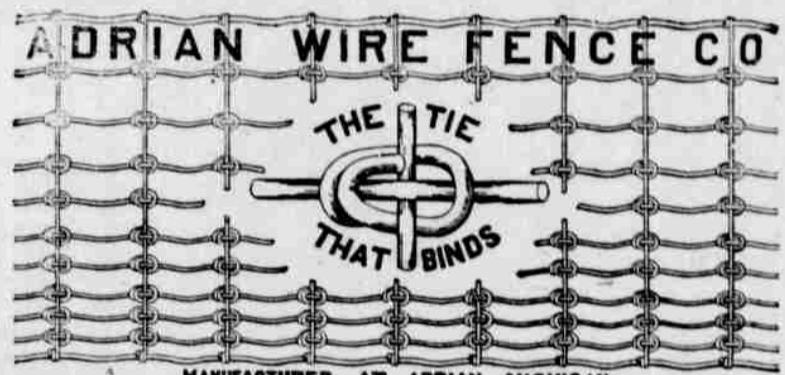

Boosters Perfect New Club At Independence.

Independence, Or., April 17.—A commercial club has been organized here with over 100 members. An organization of this kind has existed here for some time, but the new club is to be conducted on strictly business principles, leaving out the social features entirely. It will be a booster club. J. S. Cooper was elected president and Professor J. G. McIntosh, secretary, to serve one year. A. C. Moore was elected vice-president; F. J. Goodenough, assistant secretary and K. C. Eldredge, treasurer. Attorney B. F. Swope, J. W. McInturff, H. E. Browne, J. L. Hanna and W. L. Brice were appointed a committee to draft a constitution. The board of directors appointed by the president consists of A. Mackey, B. F. Swope and F. J. Goodenough. Much work is planned for the new organization, advertising will be done and especial attention will be given to securing better train service between here and Portland on the Southern Pacific railroad.

Almond Trees Thrive.

Tommy Lyons informs us that it is no trouble to grow almond trees in this vicinity, provided, of course, that you select the right soil and are particular as to location, putting them where they will be least liable to be influenced by frost conditions. On his farm near town he has out quite a number of trees, now four years old, and they are all doing fine and from the present outlook will yield quite a crop this year. Last year they bore to some extent, sufficient to show that they can be successfully grown. He says that Dr. Fink also has a number of trees that

are bearing right along. We hope this will settle the question lately raised by the Oregonian, as to whether they would not do well in our climate, and will induce the putting out of commercial orchards by those who are hunting some new horticultural product for market. There are probably a number of other species of nuts that we might just as well as not be raising here.—Dallas Itemizer.

Man Who Feared Banks Loses Hoarded Gold.

Secreting a pot containing between \$1600 and \$1800 in an out-house on his residence property and having it stolen was the recent experience of John Maxwell, who lives a mile south of Irving, where the road turns west toward Fern Ridge.

Roy Withers, a youth residing near there is being examined by District Attorney Bryson in Eugene this afternoon, having been summoned to appear before that official to tell what he knows of the theft, it being suspected that he is implicated in it.

It is learned that young Withers told a number of people in that vicinity that he took the money but that he has replaced some of it. It is also said that two other persons got a portion of the money and have left the community.

Maxwell, who is a pioneer resident of the county, is said to fear the safety of the banks and has secreted large sums of money about his residence for several years past. It is said that at the time his house burned down over two years ago he had a pot of money in one of the rooms. After the blaze had subsided he began to pour water at a certain place among the embers and soon pulled out the hoarded treasure, which had not been injured by the flames.
