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REGULAR PORTLAND LETTER

Portland, Or., April 25.—Plans for an Oregon land show, to be held next March, are now being developed by the Portland Commercial Club. Manager Cnapman believes the scheme would prove the best possible means of interesting colonists who reach Oregon at that time.

Exhibits would be gathered from all the orchard districts of the state and the exhibits would not be particularly fruits but of the land itself and how it is cultivated, giving the prospective settler an object lesson in the care of the land and the successful methods of tillage.

It is thought the show will be participated in generally by the whole state and will give each section an opportunity to display its advantages. Such an exposition would not only bring settlers but would educate those already here and influence town people to settle in the rural districts.

Musicians of four states will gather at the third annual convention of the Northwest Music Teachers' Association, which will be held in Portland June 7, 8 and 9. A program full of interest to the musical fraternity is being prepared, consisting of concerts, recitals, discussions, conferences and a banquet. The program is so arranged that it will not conflict with leading features of the Rose Festival, that will then be in progress.

It is not too early to start the annual fight against the usual timber loss, believes the Oregon Forest Fire Association, for this organization is in the field lining up timber owners to patrol their holdings during the dry season, seeking a more rigid enforcement of the law and co-operating generally in the good work. This association points out that 80 per cent of the value of the timber goes for labor and materials, thus giving the entire population a direct interest in preventing its destruction.

The Salem Board of trade has arranged a unique boost for that city. Pastors of the local churches have been induced to devote one day to preaching the attractions of Salem and the first Sunday in May has been selected for the booster sermon.

Big stakes will be offered in the race meet of the Portland Fair and Livestock Association to be held next September. Approximately \$25,000 will be distributed in prizes, according to the plans of the directors, who meet early in May to pass officially upon the program. It has been decided to offer again the \$10,000 purse for the 2:12 trot, which aroused so much interest among horsemen last year. In addition, there will be two new classifications, the 2:08 trot. Dates of the meet are September 4-9.

The sixty eighth anniversary of the organization of the first civil government on American soil west of the Rocky Mountains will be celebrated at Champoeg on May 2. This is an interesting historical observance, participated in by the pioneers who

made the early history of the Oregon country. The Oregon Pioneer Association will have charge of the exercises. Many will attend from Portland and other Western cities will send delegations.

Sheridan, Ore., April 23—The citizens of Willamina have voted \$15,000 in bonds for a waterworks system and the contract for the construction has been let. The gravity system will be used, and the water piped eight miles from the mountains, a large mountain spring being the source of the supply. The construction of the long pipe line to the mountains will be started at once, and the contract calls for the completion of the system late in the summer.
