A Get Beautiful Quick Scheme.

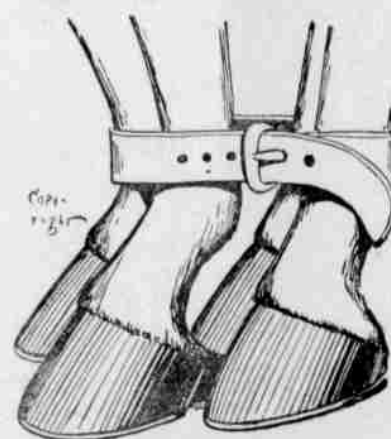
